

NEW HIGH RECORD FOR WHEAT \$1.42

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Grabbing up of spring wheat by exporters swept the wheat market today to a new high record war level of prices. May wheat easily reached \$1.42 a bushel, thus surpassing the former tip-top quotation, \$1.41 1/2, which was reached January 8, before the bulls had been intimidated by rumors that the Dardanelles would quickly be forced, and that an attack by Italy on Turkey would hasten the end of the war.

Today's advance was accompanied by reports that the Pacific coast was outbidding Minneapolis for wheat in North Dakota and that the Pacific coast crop of 1914 had been entirely disposed of. The upturn which broke the record here, however, was not accomplished until after there had been heavy profit-taking sales by dealers whose motto appeared to be safety first.

JOSEPHINE ORCHARDS CHANGE OWNERSHIP

The "Consul Orchards," owned by Messrs. H. T. Pritchard of this city and E. J. Vanderhoof of North Platte, Neb., located just west of this city, have been sold to Curt Miller, owner of the Lace House Laundry at Portland, property at Portland being taken in exchange for the orchard lands. The transaction involves property valued at \$115,000, the "Consul" orchard being valued at \$50,000, and the property taken by Messrs. Pritchard and Vanderhoof at Portland being given a valuation of \$65,000. The orchard here has choice pears and apples in full bearing, and is considered one of the show properties of the district. The Portland property taken in exchange is located on Fourteenth and Jefferson and First and Madison streets. A Portland paper quotes Messrs. Pritchard and Vanderhoof as saying they will erect buildings upon the lots this summer, a concrete building to go up on the Madison street lot while an apartment house is said to be planned for the other lot.—Grants Pass Courier.

HOT FIGHTING NEAR SOISSONS

PARIS, Jan. 14, 2:45 p. m.—The French official statement on the progress of the war given out this afternoon shows the fighting yesterday north of Soissons was most determined. The French could make no material progress on the left of their Soissons line. They held their positions on the center and were compelled to yield on their right. The French troops are described also as taking up positions on the south bank of the river Aisne.

CHICAGO TO SEND EXCURSION WEST

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Chicago will send a "business crusade" to the Pacific coast in July, it was announced today, when the First Infantry, Illinois National Guard, with band and field music, will tour from Spokane to San Francisco and San Diego, accompanied by representatives of the Chicago Association of Commerce. The regiment will leave Chicago on July 16 on the trip which will last 37 days. The principal cities on the coast will be visited.

WOULD ABOLISH PAID COACHES

PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 14.—President John Grier Hibben of Princeton University, in his annual report presented to the board of trustees today, expressed the hope that paid coaches in athletics would soon disappear. Athletics are suffering from an over-organized system of coaching, he said, and he believed that more responsibility should be placed on team captains. "If undergraduates should be released from unnatural domination of their sports by graduate coaches," he said, "inter-collegiate sport would be liberated from the abnormal incubus of a super-imposed system which tends to make puppets of the players."

STATE ASKS NATION TO KILL WILD BEASTS

SALEM, Jan. 14.—Under suspension of the rules, the senate has passed a memorial to congress asking for an appropriation of \$300,000 to be used in the extermination of predatory animals in the national forests. Senator Burgess, author of the memorial, said the annual loss to

stockmen and poultry raisers in the 225,000,000 acres in the national forests of western states amounts to \$13,000,000 a year. He said the legislatures of all western states will be asked to memorialize congress along this line.
