## PUT CRATER LAKE ON WORLDS FAIR AUTOMOBILE MAP

The first tangible result of the Sons League's activities in securing the location of Crater Lake and the listing of a special auto tour, to be known as "Crater Lake Tour," on the map to be issued by the Panama Pacific exposition for the auto manufacturers of the country.

The matter was taken up by correspondence between the exposition officials and Ben Sheldon, with the result that they sent a representative here yesterday. At a conference with the officers of the League and the county court a tentative arrangement was made, dependent upon the co-operation of Klamath county.

The map will be a splendid four-color half-tone on a topographical plan. It will show some eight or ten special auto tours radiating out from San Francisco, including Del Monte tour, Yosemite Valley tour, Lake Tahoe tour, Grand Canyon tour, Old Missions tour, etc. To this list will be added the Crater Lake tour, following the Pacific highway to Medford, thence to Crater Lake and on past Klamath Lake to Klamath Falls and rejoining the Pacific highway at Ager or Montague.

Each tour will be lined in a separate color with a printed description of the scenic attractions along the route.

This map is prepared by the exposition officials for use of auto manufacturers to advertise the fair among auto owners. The issue will be over a million copies.



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
