FORBID ADVERTISING OF ALL INTOXICANTS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28.—To discourage in every possible way the thought of alcohol in the minds of the people, the house committee having in charge the Anderson prohibition bill last night included in the bill a section absolutely forbidding advertising of any kind of intoxicant. Penalties of from \$100 to \$500 are provided for violation of the advertising section, whether in newspapers, magazines, bill boards or in any other way. The publishers of periodicals are likewise made liable as are the owners or lessees of bill boards. The amendment was put in at the instance of Representative J. S. Stewart.

After some discussion, the committee decided to allow one gallon of wine per month to clergymen for sacramental purposes only. This quantity was opposed for some time by Mr. Stewart, who asked some rather searching questions of ministers who attended the hearing.

The advertising section is the same as that of the West Virginia law, which was upheld by the United States circuit court of appeals. The committee cleared up the disputed points of the bill last night and announced that it would report it out to the house some time today.

KLAMATH HOPES FOR RAILWAY TO EUREKA
KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 28.—According to advices from Eureka, Cal., there is reason to believe that the Hill-Guggenheim interests are planning to build an electric railroad connecting Klamath Falls with Eureka on Humboldt Bay, and it is reported that surveyors are already in the field. The route is said to be along the Klamath river to Rega. It will enter Humboldt county by way of Trinidad. For the operation of the line, it is reported a power plant will be built at Klamath Falls, and that another will be constructed at Ishi Pishi Falls, on the Klamath.

WORK ON FEDERAL BUILDING BEGINS SOON
Work on the construction of the new Federal building to be built on the northwest corner of Holly and Sixth streets will be started in about two weeks according to Superintendent Crowley, of the Puget Sound Construction company, who arrived in the city yesterday. The inspector for the government is expected to arrive Friday.

Considerable of the work on the building, says Mr. Crowley will be sub-contracted. A large crew of men will be employed and the work will be rushed to completion. According to the stipulations in the contract the structure must be completed in sixteen months. The contract price for the construction is approximately \$100,000.
