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## COUNCIL CUTS RUNYARD'S SALARY

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 3.—Leading Detroit bakers announced today their bread would increase in price 1 cent a loaf beginning tomorrow. It was also said that crackers, doughnuts, cookies probably would advance from 1 to 2 cents a dozen within the next week or ten days.

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—One of the large baking companies here, the output of which is 25,000 loaves of bread daily, announced today that 1 cent would be added to the price of the 5-cent loaves tomorrow.

## STAPLES TO OPERATE HOTEL AT ASHLAND

Mrs. Louise W. Connor, landlady of the Oregon Hotel at Ashland has been declared a bankrupt before Attorney P. J. Newman, and E. T. Staples of Ashland was named trustee this morning. The first papers were filed January 18. The assets are placed at \$6000 and the liabilities at \$10,000. Trustee Staples will operate the hotel. A hearing in the matter was held this morning. The property is owned by the Ashland Hotel company.

## SMALL POX SCARE AT GOLD HILL OVER

The Gold Hill small pox scare is a thing of the past and the epidemic has worn itself out. Few of the residents think it was small pox and most of them assert it was only chicken pox—at least many of the sufferers who have recovered say it was. Whatever it was, the danger is over, and strict quarantine established on the few remaining cases.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 3.—General John J. Pershing was notified today by wire that the army of the New Mexico National Guard at Silver City, N. M., was broken into some time between Saturday night and last night and the arms and ammunition stolen. The message states that Mexicans are known to have bargained the place and that it is believed the arms and ammunition are being taken to Mexico. Thirty rifles and five thousand rounds of ammunition were secured.

## EUROPE AT WAR SPECIAL; IT TONIGHT

## VILLA DEFEATS CARRANZA FORCES

EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 3.—Following their defeat at the San Luis Potosi the Carranza troops again were routed yesterday south of the capital, according to official Villa advices received by agents here today. It was stated that the Villa column under General Banda utterly routed the retreating Carranza forces of General Benavides, capturing all their artillery and supply trains and many prisoners.
