FACTORY AWAITS EXPERT'S REPORT

If the acreage there comes up to expectations the required amount will be at hand, and the next move up to the sugar interests.

Expert Storey expects to finish his testing in that district this afternoon and has promised to advise the committee at once by telephone of his findings. If they are favorable the committee will advise Messrs. Brumwell and Nibley that they are ready to take the next step in the negotiations.

Both the beet sugar committee and the promoters are anxious to settle the issue at once, as the time is exceedingly short, if any beets are to be grown and cut this season.

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MINING BUREAU CUT TO \$35,000

SALEM, Or., Feb. 6.—Resuming its program of rigid economy, the house and senate joint ways and means committee last night decided to cut the appropriation asked by the Oregon bureau of mines and geology from \$50,000 to \$35,000 for the coming biennium. The committee directed that when the appropriation bill is drawn it stipulate that the bureau cease its investigation of clay products and drainage and confine its activities exclusively to mining.
