

CHILDREN WITH LETTERS BOOSTING BIG EXPOSITION

In order to correct misapprehension about the San Francisco fair, school children of the exposition are writing letters broadest boosting the show. The following is a sample of those received locally: "Many people seem to think that the war in Europe will interfere with our exposition. This is not true and the directors suggested that we should write to our friends and relatives and tell them so. They selected December 15th for Exposition Letter Day. Every school child as well as many grown people will send a letter today. We hope in this way to correct this false impression. "Before the beginning of the war, forty-two foreign nations had signified their intention of participating. Not one has withdrawn and Japan, The Netherlands and Argentina have asked for more space. Great Britain, France, Germany, Turkey, Canada, New Zealand, Australia and Japan will have important buildings or exhibits, in spite of the war. The pavilions of the Netherlands, Italy, Denmark, Sweden and Norway are nearing completion. "There is no question about the fact that the exposition will open on time. It is now ninety seven per cent completed and will be one hundred per cent completed by the opening day, February 20, 1915. Three months before the opening day exhibits have arrived from England, Cuba, China, Japan, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Belgium, Argentina, the Philippines, Hawaii, and the Netherlands. Several European countries in the war zone are sending their exhibits on a United States government vessel. "Every day the people visit the ground to note the progress of the work. On November 8, 37,109 people passed through the gates, the largest pre-exposition crowd on record. Besides the exposition there will be more than three hundred national and international congresses and convention meetings here in 1915. The warship pageant with President Wilson and Admiral Dewey leading. "I hope you will be able to visit our city next year and enjoy the exposition, which will be the most beautiful as well as most wonderful ever held."
