

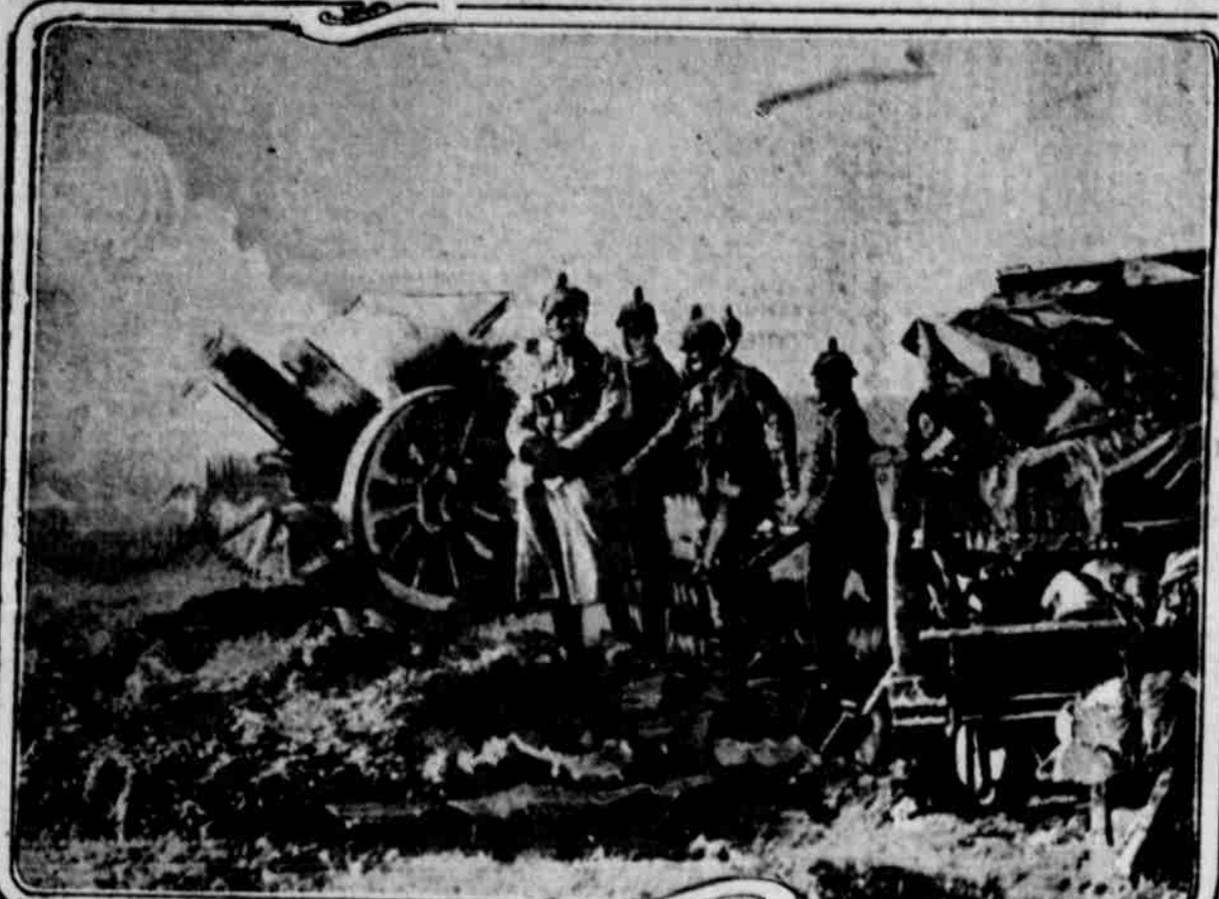
BRITISH LOSSES UP TO FEB. 4 ONLY 104,000

LONDON, Feb. 8, 5:30 p. m.—Premier Asquith, speaking in the house of commons said that British casualties in all ranks in the western arena of the war, from the beginning of hostilities to February 4th amounted to approximately 104,000 men. This includes killed, wounded and missing.

H. J. Tennant, parliamentary secretary of the war office, paid a warm tribute to the territorial troops whose value and efficiency, he declared had been proved by recent events. The British design of aeroplane, the secretary contended, has been found superior to that used by any other country.

Introducing the army estimates Mr. Tennant said he was debarred from dwelling upon the size and the distribution of the British forces. "The enemy desires more than anything else to know the force we may have in the future," the speaker explained. Recruiting on the whole has been satisfactory; there is no cause for discontent and still less for disquiet but we do want more men in this life and death struggle."

GERMAN ARTILLERY BEARS BRUNT OF FIGHTING

LONDON DECLARATION NEVER RATIFIED

LONDON, Feb. 8, 4:12 p. m.—The declaration of London has not been ratified; it is not, therefore, of the same authority as a universally ratified code of law, Neil Primrose, parliamentary under secretary for the foreign office, today told Admiral Charles Beresford in the house of commons, in reply to a question.

Mr. Primrose added that subject to certain modifications the British government was prepared to adopt the declaration of London during the present period of hostilities, but in view of the recent German announcement of an intention to disregard the laws and customs of the sea, a further modification of the British practice might be necessitated.

MISS CLARK IN MAIDEN DEBATE

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8.—Senator Kathryn Clarke, the first woman to be elected to the Oregon senate, in her initial participation in debate today, charged certain members of the resolutions committee with not acting in good faith and in turn was accused of acting arbitrarily. The debate arose over her resolution to submit to the people a constitutional amendment giving to the governor power to remove sheriffs and district attorneys from office. After an hour of debate, the senate voted 17 to 11 to postpone indefinitely action on the resolution.

ZAPATA CLOSES IN ON MEXICO CITY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Zapata forces are gradually closing in on Mexico City again, today's official dispatches report, and the apprehension is daily growing more acute over conditions generally.

Practically all the foreign diplomatic representatives there have asked their home governments for instructions as to what they should do in certain contingencies, and are hoping to be permitted to use their discretion as to abandoning their legations.

AUTO DRIVER DIES IMPALED ON FENCE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 8.—Jack Callaghan, the young racing driver injured in a motor car race at Ascot Park, died today. He was impaled upon a fence post, which rent his left side, exposing the lung. Several of his ribs were fractured.

Dust clouds raised by the racers blinded Callaghan during the 12th mile of the contest, and he ran his machine, which was then in third place, into the fence. Victor Wells, his mechanic, was unhurt.

Callaghan was 25 years old and came from Kalamazoo, Mich.
