

G. A. R. CELEBRATE LINCOLN BIRTHDAY ASHLAND ARMORY

ASHLAND, Feb. 10.—The Lincoln birthday anniversary observance occurs at the armory Friday night at 8 o'clock, under the auspices of the G. A. R., the public being invited. J. W. Hicks is commander of the local post, which is Burnside No. 23. There will be music by the Ashland band as reorganized; prayer, Rev. Mr. Blackstone; solo, E. L. Ruser; address of welcome, Rev. J. S. Smith, quarter-master of the post, who will incorporate in his remarks a biographical sketch of the great emancipator; songs, Crater Lake quartet; recitations by Rose Thomas and Alberta Knowles; song, men's quartet; Lincoln's Gettysburg address; music by the band. The main address of the evening will be given by Dr. Carnahan, Presbyterian pastor. The observance will be an eminently patriotic one, and will conclude with "The Star-Spangled Banner," sung by the audience. On Sunday, February 12, there will be a religious observance of the anniversary at the Baptist church in which, in addition to the general public, the Grand Army, Relief Corps, Sons of Veterans, Elks and Spanish Veterans will participate.

ASHLAND DAY AT EXPOSITION SET FOR JUNE 24

ASHLAND, Feb. 10.—Rumors have it that June 24 is to be Ashland day at the Panama exposition, but these stories have not yet been officially confirmed. The local papers publish the report, but the mayor and city council disavow any knowledge of it, and even the chief of police won't tell, even if he does know. Perhaps Frohbach and Lowe, high commissioners, representing this territory, now in San Francisco, have arbitrarily fixed the date, regardless of the Oregon commission.
