HOUSE COMMITTEE ON GAME UNFAIR TO FISHERMEN

SALEM, Or., Feb. 10.—The house committee on game, of which W. Al Jones is chairman, has just introduced a bill which shows more than ever that this committee as a body is not only working against the recommendations of those who are interested in better game protection, but that certain of its members have personal grievances against the different fish and game protective associations, which have objected to appointments on the game committee because the appointees advocated the abolishment of the game protection fund.

Kills Gill's Bill

In the first place, the committee has killed H. B. 16 by Gill, which embraced the recommendations of the Oregon Sportsmen's league, but has taken one or two features of the bill which were good, and combined them with other features which are objectionable to sportsmen. They have opened the season for killing ducks and geese up to April 15 in Harney, Malheur and Lake counties. Thousands of these birds are breeding and have nests and eggs by April 1. The game committee would permit the pot-hunters to have full sway, for it not only opens the season on geese during the nesting season, but its proposed substitute bill opens the sale on geese in Oregon, so that market and pot-hunters can go into eastern Oregon, where these birds are nesting by thousands, and kill them on their nests and ship them to the Portland markets for sale.

Conflicts Federal Laws

Many of the open seasons advocated by the game committee in the house are in direct conflict with the federal law for the protection of migratory birds, and even if the other members of the legislature should be deceived into voting for the measure, it is apparent that it could not be enforced because of the federal law, which takes precedence over the state law.

The most surprising feature of this substitute bill, which has been constructed at recent star chamber sessions of the committee, is that it puts an end to all salmon trout fishing in the tidewaters of all the rivers and bays of the state. These fish come in from the ocean in November and December and can be caught only during the winter season. The winter fishing for steelheads, which is one of the greatest assets of the counties along the coast, is abolished. The commercial fishermen can catch these fish with nets, but according to the drastic measure framed by the game committee, the anglers cannot catch these fish because an amendment has been slipped into this bill abolishing all winter fishing for trout.

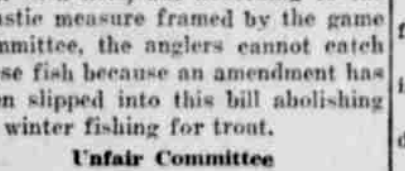
Unfair Committee

This feature of the bill is said to be a direct slap at the anglers from western Oregon, because they opposed the game committee's attempt to abolish the game protection fund. Since four members of the game committee—Ritner, Clark, Forbes and Jones—are from eastern Oregon, and Childs, the fifth member, has persistently worked against the sportsmen, and the game committee during this session, and at the last session of the legislature those people from the western counties who are interested in fair legislation to protect game have given up all hope of getting a square deal from the house game committee. But from the house itself different treatment is expected.
