PROHIBITION LAW FOR IOWA PASSES SENATE 72 TO 22

DES MOINES, Iowa, Feb. 12.—The senate today passed the measure providing for the repeal of the Iowa mule law by a vote of 27 to 22, an amendment fixing the date for it to become effective on January 1, 1916, having been previously adopted. The purpose of the bill is to provide statutory prohibition pending action on the constitutional amendment adopted this morning. Both measures now go to the house.

An amendment to the mule law bill, providing that it become effective January 1, 1916, was carried in the senate by a vote of 30 to 19. The vote on the original bill was then called for.

By a vote of 27 to 22, the senate rejected the committee report on the mule law recommending indefinite postponement. This was the second victory of the day for the "drys" leaders. Consideration of the measure to repeal the mule law was immediately taken up.

The constitutional prohibitory amendment was put to a vote without discussion. Nine of the "wets" joined with the temperance forces. In the contest last Tuesday the "drys" had only 30 votes.

As the house is "dry" by a big margin, it is contended the amendment will go through in that branch of the legislature almost without discussion.

CARRANZA EJECTS SPANISH MINISTER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Secretary Daniels received today a wireless message from the captain of the battleship Delaware saying the Spanish minister, Jose Caro, had not arrived at Vera Cruz at the time of its dispatch. The Carranza agency here issued a statement justifying Carranza's action of yesterday in ordering the minister out of Mexico, recalling President Cleveland's dismissal of Lord Sackville-West, the British ambassador, the Spanish government's dismissal of the British minister during the premiership of Lord Palmerston, and the Venezuelan government's dismissal of the ministers from Belgium and France in 1895. The Delaware has been ordered to take the minister on board for protection.

PLUMBERS TRUST HIGHEST MONOPLY YET DISCOVERED

DES MOINES, Iowa, Feb. 12.—W. E. Crosby of Philadelphia, executive clerk of the National Association of Master Plumbers of America, testifying today for the government in the trial of 36 master plumbers in the federal court said the Baltimore and New Orleans amendments to the association's constitution and by-laws in effect restricted members from selling supplies to independents.

Evidence to the effect that "no other trade in this or any other country is offered such protection," as the Master Plumbers' Association, was brought out by the prosecution during the reading of the government records and the direct examination of Crosby. Crosby said the Baltimore resolutions were framed in 1882 soon after the organization of the association and that the New Orleans "amendments" were adopted in 1899.

WANT A JOB? JUST ASK RALPH

Blanks for the carrying on of the federal employment bureau have been received at the local post office. A jobless man or employer can file his application for help or work at the post office and it will be classified and circulated through the post offices of the land. The blanks received in this city are for farm and orchard help, and contain information regarding the kind of work, number of cows to be tended, stock, and all other data of interest to a worker. The United States is divided into 18 zones, and the state of Oregon is zone 16. By this means, an accurate tab can be kept on labor conditions throughout the state.

ASK FOR DELAY WILHEMINA CASE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The American government has proposed to Great Britain a postponement of a plan to take the American steamer Wilhelmina before a prize court, that her owners may have opportunity to present evidence which they contend will prove her cargo not properly subject to seizure.

Counsel for the owners of the Wilhelmina and her cargo have represented that they can present irrefut-

ible evidence to support their argument. Should the British government agree to the proposal, action before a prize court would be unnecessary. The Wilhelmina is at Falmouth with food-stuffs consigned for the civil population of Germany. Her cargo is owned by a St. Louis commission house.

TABOO ABSINTHE IN ALL OF FRANCE

PARIS, Feb. 12.—The chamber of deputies began today the discussion of the bill for the prohibition of the sale of absinthe and similar liquors. Adolphe Girod, one of the deputies, offered statistics tending to show that absinthe drinking was dangerous only when the practice was abused.
