THE HARMONY CONCERT PARTY.
The Harmony Concert Party is made
up of four versatile musicians.
Mr. McHenry, whose work by no
means new to the Lyceum platform,
plays the mandolin, banjo, saxophone
and xylophone. He was instructor of
mandolin, guitar and banjo in Pitts-
burgh for many years, also the director
of several mandolin and banjo clubs.
