SECURING JURY TO TRY RAY TOFT

The petit jury of the February term of court opened its sessions at Jacksonville this morning. The first case is that of the state against Ray Toft of this city charged with perjury. Toft is alleged to have falsified regarding the whereabouts of stolen goods, he is alleged to have purchased. Most of the week will be taken up with the hearing of civil cases. The first case set for next week is that of Lorin Martin, accused of the slaying of Game Warden A. S. Hubbard, near Trail last December. Up to 2:00 o'clock this afternoon, the work of securing a jury was under way in the Toft case.

RAILROAD NEED NOT SHOW FILES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The supreme court held today that the interstate commerce commission has no authority to inspect correspondence files in the interstate railways. It sustained the federal district court for western Kentucky in refusing to compel the Louisville & Nashville railroad to permit commission examiners to inspect its files.

HOUSE COMMITTEE VOTES TO PURCHASE MONTICELLO

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The house rules committee today voted to report a special rule for consideration of a bill appropriating \$500,000 for purchase of Monticello, the Virginia estate of Thomas Jefferson.

ECONOMY CRY IN JACKSONVILLE

The Jacksonville political pot has begun its annual simmering. Next Tuesday there is a city election, and the fate of the city attorney and the street commissioner hangs in the balance, with a clip in the salary of the marshal. Economy is the battle cry, and the opening shots have been fired.

Two sets of councilmanic candidates are in the field. Messrs. Melntyre and Johnson, caucus nominees, held to be working with the present administration, and Chauncey Florey and Judge J. R. Nell, nominated by petition, and on an economy platform.

The main issues in the combat seem to be the jobs of City Attorney Herbert Hanna and Street Commissioner Chris Ulrich. Hanna draws a salary of \$300 a year. Ulrich's recompense is \$4 per day when he works. Many maintain Jacksonville has no need of a city attorney and much less for a street commissioner. The economy candidates declare they will clip this expense, and also take a whack at the monthly stipend of the marshal.

MOST FAILURES IN HIGHER MATHEMATICS

A tabulation of failures in subjects taught in the Medford high school shows that algebra and geometry were thorns. The percentage of failure in algebra for the first semester was 16.5, and for geometry, 12.6. Sixteen failed in the first-named subject, out of a total of 95 students, and 12 failed in geometry out of a total of 97.

In English the percentage of failures was 7.2; in history, which embraces Roman, Greek, mediaval and United States histories, the percentage of failures was 12.

In the sciences, embracing five subjects, the percentage was 9.8, and in German 6.8, while out of sixteen students taking French none failed. The percentage of failures for Latin was 8.1.

In penmanship the failure percentage was 3.8 and for shorthand 10.

APPROPRIATION BILLS DISCUSSED BY CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Congress devoted its attention again today to consideration of appropriations for national defense.

Defense on the army bill, carrying about \$163,000,000, was continued when the senate met today.

In the house consideration of the fortifications bill was continued.
