Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Myers were visiting Mrs. L. A. Hessler last Saturday.

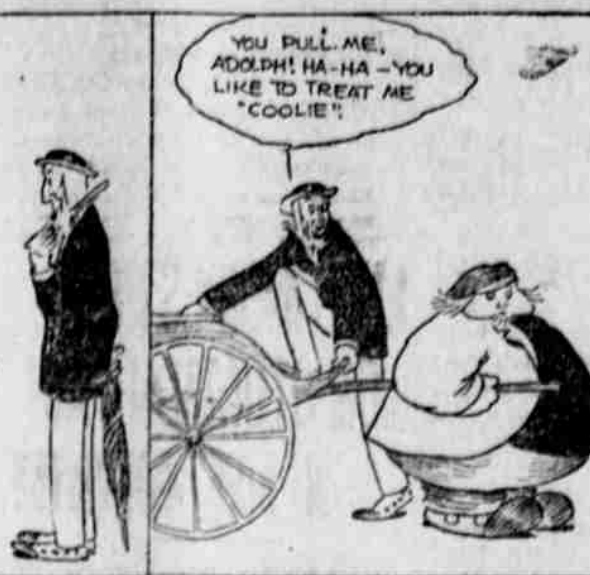

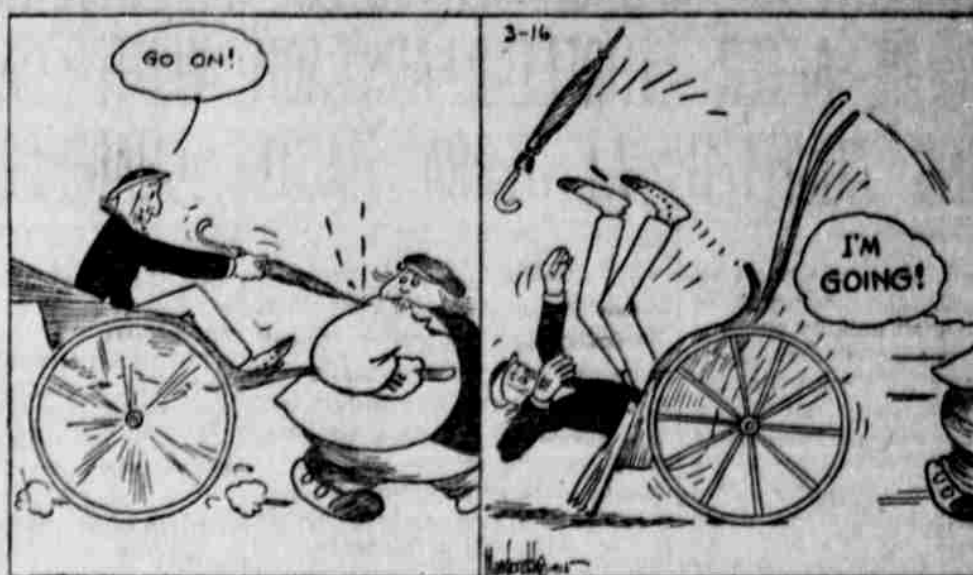
