Immediately General Salazar, the post commander, expressed his appreciation to the diplomatic corps for their efforts to save the city from famine and promised not only protection to the lives and property of foreigners, but to provide transportation facilities to bring food into the city.

The international relief committee to which General Obregon refused transportation facilities to obtain supplies, then reassembled and Gen-

eral Salazar arranged to have one of his representatives co-operate with them. That, it was believed, will solve the food problem.

The Brazilian minister telegraphed that at the time of filing of his dispatch the city was quiet and good order was being maintained. Only three cases of looting had been reported to him, that of a British French and German subject, details of which were given to him by the German and French ministers and the British charge d'affaires.
