

\$500,000 IN GEMS OF SPANISH REGIME BROUGHT TO PRIESTS

NEW YORK, March 16.—A king's ransom in jewels, blazoned in the royal eagles of Spain at the time of Charles V, the most powerful monarch of the sixteenth century, lies today under guard at the customs house here, awaiting appraisal. The value of the jewels is estimated at between \$300,000 and \$500,000. The gems, set in gold and white and purple robes and mounted on two golden crowns, were brought into New York by a Catholic priest, clad in shabby clothes, who fled from Mexico City a month ago, made his way to Vera Cruz and sailed aboard the steamer Montevideo, which reached New York March 6. With this priest and six other fugitive priests who had been banished from Mexico by General Obregon, General Carranza's lieutenant at Mexico City.

Dazzle Inspectors
From the depths of a battered suitcase the gems and robes were tumbled out upon the dock for inspection by the customs authorities. The jewels so dazzled the inspectors that they were put back into the suitcase and taken to a safe deposit vault. This rich prize, it is said, lay in the cathedral of Mexico City—presumably for centuries, till it slipped through Carranza's fingers in the priest's flight from Mexico. It was learned, however, that he had said he had packed the jewels and robes in his suitcase when General Obregon called for a church tax of \$500,000, looking up many Catholic priests in Mexico City until the tax was raised.

Archbishop's Costly Robe
An archbishop's robe of purple is the chief article of value. The robe is of silk and apparently of great antiquity. Wrought in diamonds and emeralds, rubies and pearls, on the front of the robe so that it covers the wearer's breast, is the ancient Spanish coat of arms—double eagles, back to back, wings raised and beaks open. The gems are mounted in gold.

From the double eagle design the customs officers believe there is truth in the priest's story that the robes were sent to Mexico in the sixteenth century. Spain in that period was at the height of her power and her ruler, Don Carlos I, was known as Charles V, of the holy Roman empire.

TURKS PLACE GUNS AT DARDANELLES

BERLIN, March 16, (by wireless).—The correspondent at Athens of the Lokal Anzeiger says in a dispatch that the Turks have succeeded in placing new heavy guns in the Kum Kale battery at the mouth of the Dardanelles, which have replied fiercely to the fire of a French gun.

Continuing the correspondent says that two badly damaged cruisers have been taken into Malta. These vessels had been struck fairly no less than 20 times.

German military critics commenting on the official report of the second retreat of the Tenth Russian army look upon it as equivalent to an important victory not because of the losses inflicted upon the Russians, but because of the moral effect. They declare it is evident that only weather conditions prevented the Russian retreat from being cut off.

1,050,029 PRUSSAINS KILLED OR WOUNDED

LONDON, March 16.—The last eight official Prussian casualty lists, number 166 to number 173, contains 33,142 names, bringing the grand total of killed, wounded and missing since the war broke out to 1,050,029 men, according to a dispatch to the evening news from Copenhagen. The last four lists include the names of 11 airmen killed, four wounded and two taken prisoners.

It should be borne in mind that these totals refer to Prussia. They don't take into account 160 Bavarian, 136 Wuertemberg, 119 Saxon and 20 navy lists.

GERMAN CORRESPONDENTS EXPELLED FROM ITALY

PARIS, March 16.—A special dispatch from Rome says the government has issued an order expelling from Italy the correspondents of the Vienna Tagblatt and the Frankfurter Zeitung.

BERLIN REPORTS ENEMY REPULSED ON BOTH FRONTS

BERLIN, March 16, (by wireless).—The German war office today gave out a report on the progress of the fighting which is dated March 16 and which reads as follows:

"The English position on the height near St. Eloi, south of Ypres has been taken by the Germans. Fighting for the possession of this location has been going on since the day before yesterday. "In the Champagne district several attacks delivered by French troops broke down in the face of German fire. The French losses were heavy. To the north of Beaumont, German troops took possession of several French trenches. An engagement began yesterday in the Argonne continues today. Also in the Vosges there are several places where the fighting is still going on. "On the Orzye, to the northeast of Przasnysz, Russian attacks everywhere have been repulsed. There was a specially violent engagement for the possession of Jednorozek. Two thousand Russians were taken prisoners. "South of the Vistula there is nothing to report."

NETHERLANDS JOINS UNCLE SAM'S PROTEST

WASHINGTON, March 16.—Chevalier van Rajapard, Netherlands minister, informally opened negotiations at the state department today to determine what action may be taken by the United States and Netherlands to obtain an amelioration of the British order in council.
