

COUNTY PLANS TO BETTER EXHIBIT AT EXPOSITION

The county court is making preparations for a more adequate representation at the Panama exposition and has delegated Commissioner Madden to look after it, and appointed several committees to assist.

"We have appointed a committee composed of H. W. Bingham, Bert Anderson and F. W. Streets to secure pictures, by loans or otherwise, of orchards, orchard homes, highway scenes, Medford and Ashland and Rogue River valley scenes, also any other articles, such as produce, minerals, fruit, etc., that will interest the public in the Rogue River valley.

"We have named Edgar Hafer and Frank Owens as a committee to secure sample slabs of our fir, pine and other varieties of native timber, one side dressed and finished, one left rough with the bark, to make a display of our timber resources.

"We have named George Putnam, Evan Reames, Bill Isaacs and R. W. Ewing to produce a sporting exhibit that will attract attention to the hunting and fishing resources of Jackson county.

"We have arranged with A. C. Allen to get up a moving picture reel, telling the story of the Rogue River valley and Crater Lake. The county court appropriated \$600 to cover the expenses of the same, and he is donating his services and machinery free of charge. In these movies all phases of our domestic life will be featured, as well as the history of the valley and moving panoramas of our beautiful scenery, as well as the legend of Crater Lake.

"We have arranged with State Game Warden Finley to secure duplicates of his reels, showing steelhead fishing in the Rogue by local anglers.

"We have instructed Mr. Lowe to rearrange his product exhibit, which is at present along lines of too many others to attract the attention it merits. A few good pictures will be added, better containers and a more artistic arrangement.

"We have ordered 5000 unique booklets in the shape of a pear, printed for distribution, which will be kept where the larger booklets are never looked at.

"We have authorized the framing of the Crater Lake pictures and paintings loaned by Mr. Kiser and authorized Leonard Carpenter, who is at the fair, and has volunteered his services, to look after these special features and co-operate with Mr. Frobach in the installation and placing of them. Mr. Frobach will remain in charge of all exhibits, as he is doing as well as his resources permit.

"We are securing the valley for fruit and ask the co-operation of the general public in furnishing anything that can be displayed to advantage."

STEGLER POSED AS MADDEN FOR FALSE PASSPORT

NEW YORK, March 17.—Richard P. Stegler, German naval reservist, government witness in the trial of Richard Madden and Gustave Cook, charged with aiding Stegler to procure a false American passport, was submitted today to further cross examination by Charles F. Oberwager, attorney for the defendants. The attorney resumed his attack upon Stegler's character. After denying all implications the witness was excused and Frederick G. Behle took the stand.

Behle said he was Stegler's former room mate in Hoboken. He corroborated Stegler's testimony that Stegler had met Cook in Behle's room and there and that he (Behle) had stepped outside while the other two were discussing the matter of getting the papers necessary to procure Stegler a passport.

Edourd D. Harrington, manager of a steamship company, testified that Stegler had turned over to him for keeping the false passport, the birth certificate alleged to have been procured by Madden for Stegler, three letters introducing Stegler to persons abroad and two letters and telegrams addressed to Stegler. Harrington said he turned the papers over to the editor of a New York evening paper.

Charles G. Leonhardt, custom house broker, testified he had identified Stegler, as Madden before the clerk of the United States district court when Stegler applied for the passport, but said that he believed Madden was Stegler's correct name. He admitted knowing Stegler two years, but said he had not called him by any name until Stegler, in saying that he desired a passport, told him his name was Madden.

PRESIDENT THANKS CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORERS

BOSTON, March 17.—Rev. Francis E. Clark, founder of the Christian Endeavor movement, made public today a letter from President Wilson in reply to a message from the organization requesting him to endeavor to unite the representatives of the neutral nations in some common efforts that might bring about a lasting world peace. The president's letter follows:

TWO MORE BRITISH SHIPS TORPEDOED BY SUBMARINES

LONDON, March 17.—Official announcement was made today that the British steamers Atlanta and Pingal had been torpedoed.

The text of the communication follows: "The British steamer Atlanta, 519 tons, owned by Messrs. J. and H. Hutchinson of Glasgow was torpedoed by a German submarine off Inishurk on the west coast of county Galway, Ireland, about noon of March 14. The crew was landed on Inishurk Island and the vessel is now in the harbor.

"The British steamer Pingal of 1,662 gross tons (661 net tons) owned by the London-Edinburgh Shipping company of Leith, Scotland, was torpedoed and sunk at 10:50 a. m. March 15, off Northumberland coast.

DRESDEN BLOWN UP BY HER OWN CREW TO ESCAPE CAPTURE

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, today received an official report that the cruiser Dresden was blown up by her own crew after having been attacked in neutral waters off Chile by British warships.

The official report added that British ships began firing from a distance of 3000 meters, but that rather than be destroyed by the enemy's ships, the commander of the Dresden chose to save his crew and abandon the vessel. The report came from the German legation at Santiago, Chile.

Twenty members of her crew were landed at North Shields, but six lives were reported to have been lost including the chief mate and the stewardess."
