FOUR SAVED IN PORTLAND BLAZE

PORTLAND, March 22.—Four persons were carried unconscious down fire escapes and 35 others narrowly avoided death in a fire which gutted the Grand Oak apartment house, 66 1/2 Grand avenue here early today.

Mrs. Helen Gould, an invalid, Mr. and Mrs. John Bracken and George Cleland, the janitor, were rescued by policemen and firemen after they had been overcome by smoke. The fire was discovered by two patrolmen who were attracted to the scene by an explosion in a paint store beneath the apartment. The flames spread so quickly that the roomers were cut off from the stairway and elevator. Few saved any personal effects. The loss amounted to \$42,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 22.—Lewis Watkins, a negro, testified in the Terre Haute election fraud cases today that he earned \$47 by voting and "shooting craps with other repeaters" in Terre Haute last election day. He voted about nineteen times, he said.
