Bullard Kelly left on the limited for Weed, Cal., where he expects to remain for the summer.

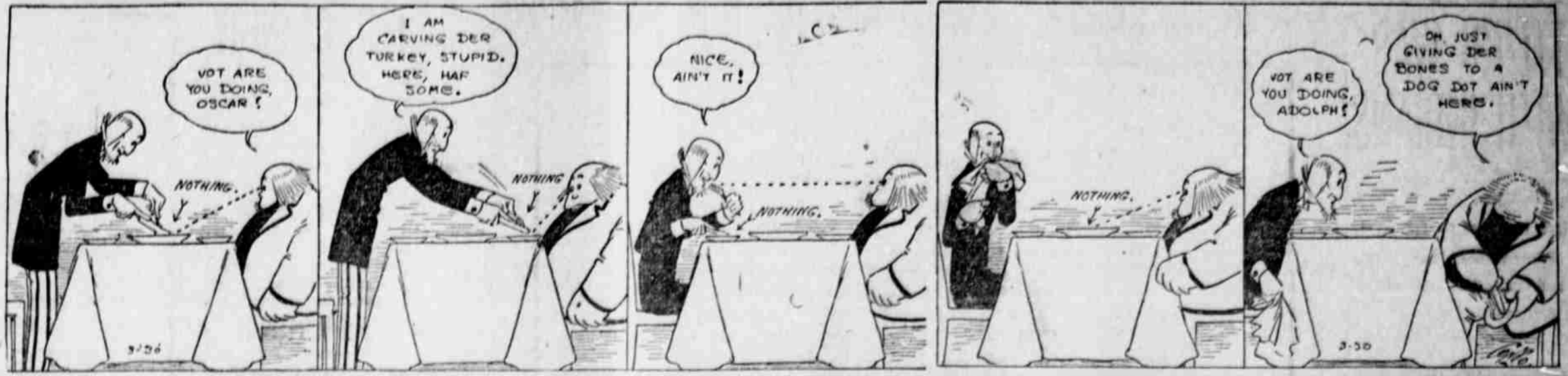
