MOTORCYCLE TO BE LISTED FOR TAXATION

Under the provisions of a law passed by the last legislature, motorcycles will be assessed and upon upon the tax rolls for next year. Assessors of the state have been instructed to notify their deputies to assess motorcycles, irrespective of the vehicle tax, which heretofore has exempted them. Motorcycles are now listed as personal property. The machines in this county range in value from \$125 to \$200 and will result in additional money. There are between 150 and 175 motorcycles in use in Jackson county.

FIRST ORCHARD HEATING OF YEAR

The first frost of the season occurred Wednesday night, March 24, the anniversary of the first heavy frost of last season. The heaviest frost occurred the following night, and the outlook is for another frost tonight. These two frosts a year ago caught the orchardists unprepared, with the season a week or ten days ahead of the present season.

The thermometer last night dropped to 29 in Medford and at low points on the floor of the valley to 26. Bartlett's and D'Anjous were just beginning to bloom, and the crop will not be affected materially. Other varieties were not endangered.

Most of the orchardists had plenty of oil, and the endangered orchards resorted to heating, so were not affected. No frost warning was given and the equipment sent down for the frost survey of the valley has not yet been installed. Special frost observer Drake, detailed from Portland, has been awaiting word from County Pathologist Henderson to come, and it was generally supposed that the danger period had not yet arrived. The hot weather of the past week, however, has forced the bloom.

Until the arrival of Observer Drake, A. C. Allen will act as observer and send out frost warnings.
