

JITNEY SERVICE TO EXPOSITION TO START MAY FIRST

According to present plans, the jitney service between Puget Sound and San Francisco to handle the tourist travel during the fair, will begin on May 1, with this city as one of the division points. The project is backed by Seattle capitalists. The preliminary details have all been arranged and the first advertising circulars sent out. In them a side trip to Crater Lake is listed as one of the features from this city.

It is expected that a representative of the company will be in this city next week to arrange for the construction of a tent city for the overflow at the fair grounds, which have been leased to the company by the Jackson County Fair association. Similar cities will be established at Roseburg and Eugene in this state.

The proposition is expected to bring to southern Oregon hundreds of people who otherwise would catch only a fleeting glimpse of the country from car windows and be of inestimable value from an advertising standpoint.

To date, Oregon is receiving nothing from the railroads of the northwest. The Hill lines are concentrating all their advertising in singing the praises of an ocean trip on their liner, the Great Northern, from Flavel to San Francisco, and the Southern Pacific in its newspaper publicity urges the southwest route, where, as one reads, "the last of the cattle kings roam."

SCHOOL BURGLAR IN COUNTY JAIL

L. Renier, arrested Wednesday by Chief of Police Hittson on a charge of burglarizing the Washington school last Friday night, and attempting to rob the home of Frank Craig on Eleventh street by kicking in the front door, was bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Taylor at the preliminary hearing held this morning, with bonds at \$500, which the prisoner was unable to furnish.

The past of Renier is being investigated. His picture will be taken and sent to the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., for identification. The police believe that he has a long criminal record. Renier attempted to prove an alibi by proving that he was in California towns when the burglaries were committed in this city.

Renier was remanded to the county jail. He makes the second prisoner in that institution.

SHERIDAN USED DEPOSITORS COIN FOR SPECULATIONS

PORTLAND, Or., March 25.—Numerous witnesses were called to the stand today in the United States district court to testify to the alleged misuse of deposits in the First National Bank of Roseburg by Thomas R. Sheridan, its former president. Sheridan is charged with abstracting for his own use \$18,020 belonging to depositors.

Mrs. W. T. De War of Gardner, Or., testified that Sheridan told her she should loan her money out at interest, but that she had replied she would not authorize anything without seeing her husband. She said she never talked with Sheridan after that. United States District Attorney Clarence L. Reames then introduced a memorandum check to show that Sheridan had taken \$3000 from Mrs. De War's account. None of this had been repaid, Mrs. De War said, except interest for one year.

MONS RETREAT MOST CRITICAL

characteristic promptness and decisiveness.

"On the retreat from Mons at Le Cateau, we were in the open country and in a very dangerous position, and the German ambition for the annihilation of our little army might have been realized if our cavalry had not been equal to its task of covering the ranks of our steady disciplined regiments."

"A good deal has been said about the novel conditions which trench warfare has developed," was the next thing said by the correspondent, "has it changed the qualities required of a soldier?"

Elements of Success

"No," he replied. "Human na-

ture remains the same, and it is the man who gives and takes the blows whatever the nature of his weapons. Courage, discipline and tenacity are still the dominant elements of success."

"And the guns; it has been repeatedly stated that this has become a war of artillery."

"I think there has been inclination to exaggerate the importance of artillery," Sir John answered. "No doubt of the three arms, artillery has increased in relative importance. It

may take a dozen shells to get one man and one bullet will get one man. The weapons which decide the day are the rifle and the machine gun, and the infantry is still the queen of battles."

Tribute to Germans

As a soldier speaking of his enemy, Sir John French was far from depreciating the fighting qualities of the Germans. To the troops of Emperor William he paid a soldier's chivalrous tribute. "But they are no greater than other soldiers," he said. "I

attribute their valor and their well disciplined cohesion to the fact that from the cradle are taught discipline and to worship their emperor and the fatherland and that it is their duty to die for the fatherland when their emperor commands."

"As to the conduct of the Germans, is it as bad as reported," was asked of Sir John. "Have they consistently broken the rules of civilized warfare?"

Blames the Officers
For the first time the commander

hesitated before speaking. Evidently as a soldier he wished to be entirely just to the enemy.

"Yes," he replied, "in many instances their conduct has been bad, very bad; I know that it has been."

This declaration was made with firm conviction. "But it has varied. It has seemed to depend upon the commanders. If a commander approves of outrages, they occur. Yes, in the main, German conduct depends upon the character of the German generals."
