GRAND JURY PROBES TANZER PERJURY

NEW YORK, April 1.—The federal grand jury took up today the case of Miss Rae Tanzer, who was held for that body on a charge of using the mails to defraud after she had entered a suit for \$50,000 against James W. Osborne, former assistant district attorney of New York, alleging breach of promise to marry.

Robert Wood, assistant United States district attorney, in charge of the case, went to the grand jury room, bearing a manuscript of the statement Miss Tanzer made three days ago in which she said she made an "honest mistake" when she identified James W. Osborne, as the man she knew as Oliver Osborne with whom she had associated. James W. Osborne was under subpoena to appear before the jury during the afternoon.

Upon the motion of Harold Spellberg, Miss Tanzer's attorney. Supreme Court Justice Bijur dismissed the breach of promise suit brought by Miss Tanzer.

CUSTOMS RECEIPTS SHOW GREAT GAIN

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Customs receipts for March totalled \$19,580,325, the greatest sum collected during any one month since the outbreak of the European war. At that rate treasury officials expect the fiscal year's customs collections will fall only ten millions below the estimate of \$220,000,000.

Total treasury receipts for March were \$56,398,959, thirteen millions more than February. Disbursements were \$61,398,792, leaving an approximate deficit of five millions for the month, and the ordinary deficit for the fiscal year ending June 30 at a little more than \$88,000,000. Income taxes, however, during the next two months are expected to reduce that amount materially.

The balance in the general fund at the end of March was \$35,769,611.

Violation of Open Door

It is further contended that if Japan insisted on the purchase by China of munitions of war in Japan and insisted that she be consulted with regard to certain foreign loans in the province of Fukien, in South Manchuria and in Eastern Mongolia, this course might be a violation of the principle of equal opportunity stipulated in the agreement reached between Baron Takahira when he was minister to the United States and Elihu Root, at that time secretary of state. That agreement provides for maintaining the independence and integrity of China and the equality of commercial opportunity in that country.

MARKLEY GIVEN RESPITE ON EVE OF PRISON TERM

Word from Washington states that five members of the notorious Markley gang of swindlers, sentenced after two years' legal battle, were given a thirty days' respite on the eve of beginning their prison terms by President Wilson, upon the intervention of ex-Congressman A. M. Palmer, now chief justice of the court of claims. Markley headed a gang of "the biggest and most dangerous get-rich-quick gang of swindlers ever convicted by the government."

Markley was, year ago, prominent in politics in Oregon, and well known in Jackson and Josephine counties, where he made the present ownership books in conjunction with the late John O. Booth.

In the gang convicted were John R. Markley, Isaiah B. Miller, Charles M. McMahon, William H. Armsstrong, Jr., and Colonel A. C. Stewart.

EITEL PREPARES FOR DASH TO SEA

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., April 1.—Activity continued today on board and about the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, whose three week's stay at the shipyard dock here is expected to be terminated within a very brief time either by a dash to sea through the squadron of Anglo-French warships lying in wait for her outside the Virginia Capes, or by internment until the close of the war.

Colling of the vessel under supervision of officers of the United States navy, which began late yesterday and continued throughout the night, had not been completed at 8 o'clock this morning, and there still was a considerable part of the 600

tons of fuel to be taken aboard. At an early morning hour a tug with more barges of coal reached the Eitel's side. All night a part of the crew of the cruiser had worked at filling the ship's bunkers and a fresh lot of men took up the labor at sunrise.
