Anton Kuepferle, who was recently arrested by the British authorities and is being held for trial on the charge of enpionage, says he was born in Germany in 1884 and that he became a naturalized American citizen in Brooklyn in 1912. CHIEF SCULPTOR

NEW YORK, April 10.-Karl Theodore Francis Bitter, chief of the department of sculpture of the Panama Pacific exposition, and one of the best-known sculptors of this country, died in a hospital here today of injuries he suffered when he and Mrs. Butter were run down last night by on automobile in Broadway. Mr. Bitter was director of sculpture of the Buffalo exposition and chief of the department of sculpture of the St. Louis exposition. He had executed many important private commissions, including the statue of Karl Schurz here and works in the homes of Collis P. Huntington, Cornelius Vanderbilt and other wealthy men. He designed the Astor Gates for Trinity church here.

He was a member of the national institute of arts and letters and an academician of the National Academy of Design. Mr. Bitter was 47 years old, coming here in 1889 from Frank Kasshafer. Vienna, where he was born. His home was in this city.


