

TROPHIES OF ROD AND GUN SHIPPED TO PANAMA FAIR

Trophies of the chase, comprising a dozen black, brown and cinnamon bears, nine cougars, a dozen mounted deer heads, a hundred pair of deer antlers, wolf, coyote, bobcat skins, mounted bear cubs, cougar kittens, civit cat, deer, gray squirrel, pheasants and grouse, together with trophies of the rod, comprising mounted salmon, steelhead and cutthroat trout are being shipped to the Panama exposition at San Francisco today for a special exhibit depicting the hunting and fishing attractions of Jackson county. F. W. Bartlett, the well-known taxidermist, has for the past two weeks been working, preparing and boxing the exhibit under direction of the special committee named by the county court, and has left for San Francisco, where he will install it and preside over it the coming summer.

It is the intention to install the exhibit in the Horticultural building, which is more central than the Oregon building and visited by ten times the number of people. A space seventy feet in length has been reserved and in this space a hunting camp will be erected, amid green forest trees, and the trophies of rod and gun grouped in artistic and natural fashion. In the trees in the background will be placed the mounted animals. Mr. Bartlett will be on hand to supply literature and information.

Most of the exhibits have been loaned by the public-spirited citizens and sportsmen of Jackson county, who have taken a keen interest in the display. The total value of the collection, as insured, totals over \$1,500. To secure the fish, a special permit was issued by State Game Warden Finley and a dozen steelhead secured by net at Gold Ray. Another dozen steelhead and cut-throat were sent down from the Elk Creek hatchery by Superintendent O'Malley, and all of them mounted in lifelike fashion by Mr. Bartlett. As the season progresses, it is expected to increase the fish display materially, and anglers will be asked to send in their choicest specimens.

All of the exhibits are the very best of their kind in the county. Many were refused because not in first-class condition. Among those who loaned are the following:

State Game Warden Finley has agreed to send a dozen pairs of live Chinese pheasants that will be taken care of by Mr. Bartlett as part of Jackson county's exhibit.

CRATER LAKE IS MOST TALKED OF RESORT AT FAIR

"The horticultural palace at the San Francisco fair is the biggest drawing card on the exposition grounds," said H. O. Frohbach of Ashland, in charge of the southern Oregon exhibit, who is on a brief visit here, "and shows the growing interest of the people in fruit. The agricultural palace is drawing the smallest attendance. I have a letter from the fair superintendent showing that an average of 10,000 people daily visit the horticultural building. The southern Oregon exhibit has the most prominent place in this building and is attracting wide attention. Jackson county is the only county in the state making any pretense toward a fruit exhibit. We have forty-five display boxes of apples and show fruit in the process form. There is much interest in Crater lake.

"The Crater lake views taken by Kaiser are hung at the entrance to the Oregon building and are viewed daily by large throngs. They will be the means of bringing scores of tourists to the wonder spot the coming season. Many people do not understand that the lake season is not for the entire year. I heard more mention of Crater lake than any other scenic place in the west."

Mr. Frohbach urges that as fast as new fruit arrives it be shipped to the fair for exhibition. In order to insure quick delivery, it should be sent by express and the same prepaid.

Mr. Frohbach will return to his work at the fair next Tuesday. He states that the exhibits in the Oregon building are daily improving.

COUSIN OF CORBIN EDGELL KILLED IN EUROPEAN WAR

Corbin Edgell, ranch owner in the Eagle Point district, received a telegram yesterday announcing the death of his cousin, Andre Champollion, of New York, a member of the American Legion of Honor fighting at the front in France. According to the telegram Champollion fell shot through the forehead, while leading a charge in the forest of La Prairie.

Champollion was born in Paris but had lived most of his life in this country being a graduate of Harvard University in the class of 1902 and was known to several Harvard graduates in the valley. Deceased was only 34 years old, and was an artist of considerable promise. He leaves a wife and one child. The last letter received from Champollion by Mr. Edgell described the horror of trench warfare, but the writer was in excellent spirits and declared war reminded him very much of American football.
