ization was found. Mr. Barnes replied that Mr. Platt was right, even after I said such government was bound to lead to rottenness.

"I told Mr. Barnes Senator Platt had told me he had decided upon a superintendent of public works who was satisfactory and that Senator Platt had congratulated me upon getting such a good man."

"In 1908 Mr. Barnes spoke with me generally on the subject of legislation. He said Governor Hughes was favoring legislation against the interests of the organization and that the democratic organization was backing up the republicans in defeating legislation fostered by Governor Hughes.

Barnes Boasted of Control

"Mr. Barnes said he and his friends had control of the party. He did not say he himself was personally in control. He did say that Mr. Hughes could not take the control away from those in whom it was invested."

A letter from Mr. Barnes to Mr. Roosevelt was offered in evidence. It was dated from the Albany Journal office and in part said:

"Ever since he has been governor, Mr. Hughes has endeavored through his speeches and his attitude to arouse resentment in every locality against the men who have been doing the political work of the republican party. Some of these men are the best and most unselfish of men. Some of them are the meanest and most selfish of men."

Barnes Letter Offered

"It was a gauge of battle thrown down which it was my duty to resist, because if I am to remain in the leadership of this country, that leadership must be satisfactory to the republican people of the country. I cannot be exploited as a machine-made politician or a patronage broker without resisting the charge to the best of my strength."

"I never could subscribe to the doctrine advanced by the governor, which was this: Disagreement with him meant that a man was a rascal. What I am most deeply interested in is this subject of direct elections."

In the letter Mr. Barnes says: "The men with whom I have been cooperating will never relinquish the fight against the principle of the direct nominations," and declares that the so-called sentiment for direct primaries is purely pro-Hughes sentiment and had nothing to do with the merits of the proposal.

"Direct nominations are an invitation to party discord, but their evil could be minimized by the holding of unofficial primaries and unofficial conventions which would be unquestionably done."

"The idea of getting rid of bosses is absurd, so long as you have party government."

Mr. Roosevelt continued: "I learned that Senator Grattan had expressed his opposition of the legislation, but he changed his mind after talking with Mr. Barnes. Mr. Grattan pleaded with Mr. Barnes to allow him to vote as he wanted, but I was told he said Mr. Barnes ordered him to vote oppositely and he was forced to do so. Senator Grattan's one vote defeated the bill. Senator Grattan represented Mr. Barnes' district."

"Did you talk to Senator Davenport about Senator Jonathan P. Aills?"

"Yes," replied the witness. Aills resigned from the senate after he had been charged with accepting bribes.

ALLIES VICTORS IN WEST AFRICA

PARIS, April 21.—The French war department today announced that allied forces had gained a victory in the operations against the Germans in Kamerun, a German colony of Western Equatorial Africa. The text of the statement follows:

"After heavy fighting of the last few months the German troops in Kamerun have been forced to retreat from the high plateaus situated in the center of the colony. The seat of the government has been transferred to Jaunde. The movement of the allied forces in this direction continues."

"French native troops from Central Africa have attained in the east of the line Lomle-Dume. Toward the west the troops commanded by Colonel Mayer following the railway line have succeeded in forcing a passage across the Kelo river.

"British troops marching in a northerly direction and following the Eden-Jaunde road have taken possession of the Ngwas bridge.

"Two brilliant engagements caused the allies insignificant losses."

PETROGRAD, April 21.—Ten German aeroplanes raided the town of Bialystok, in Russian Poland, forty-five miles southwest of Grodno, on Tuesday morning and threw down upon it more than 100 bombs.
