JOHN D. JR. GIVEN LIE BY AMMONS

DENVER, Colo., April 24.—Former Governor E. A. Ammons, when shown the correspondence between John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and Ivy M. Lee, as made public by Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the Federal Industrial Relations Commission said: "I never sent out a letter on any phase of the Colorado coal miners strike that I did not prepare myself. I never heard of Mr. Ivy L. Lee, until his name was brought out at the Denver investigation of the Industrial Relations Commission and never had any correspondence with him. I furnished copies of all my correspondence on the strike to the industrial relations commission during the Denver hearing."

Mr. Ammons added: "The only time I ever met a representative of Mr. Rockefeller was a few weeks ago when W. L. MacKenzie King discussed with me labor conditions in Colorado."

CLAIM LAWSON LEAD STRIKERS IN LUDLOW BATTLE

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 24.—The charge that John R. Lawson, international executive board member of the United Mine Workers of America, was in command of the striking coal miners in the battle near Ludlow, October 25, 1913, when John Nimmo, a deputy sheriff, was killed, was made in the opening statement today by Norion Montgomery, assistant attorney general. Lawson is on trial charged with murder in connection with Nimmo's death.

According to Montgomery, Nimmo, a deputy sheriff, was one of a force of officers stationed near Ludlow to preserve order and prevent clashes between strikers and mine guards prior to the arrival of the militia. The deputies were attacked, Montgomery declared, and fought the battle in defense of their lives. During the fight Nimmo was shot in the left leg, the bullet severing the femoral artery. He died soon after.

The assistant attorney general told the jury that John R. Lawson then was in charge of the Ludlow tent colony, had bought and imported arms, and was in direct command of the strikers who did the fighting.
