It is believed the Leon Gambetta had on board a crew numbering 714 men, including twenty two officers. A majority of the men were asleep at the time the cruiser was sunk.

BERLIN, April 28.—Telegrams received in Berlin today from Czernowitz, the capital of Bukowina, say that the Austrians have stormed and captured the town of Bojan, to the east of Czernowitz. Bojan is the key to the Russian positions which now are thrown back to the extreme frontier of Bukowina.

The attack was so surprising, the dispatches say, that the Russian general staff barely escaped capture. The Austrian mortars are reported to have caused the heaviest losses among the Russians.
