

## POSTER STAMPS USED BY PYTHIANS FOR LAKE MEET

Poster stamps of Rogue river valley scenery, the product of the Medford Printing company, will be attached to all correspondence of the Oregon grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias, who August 17 will hold an initiation at Crater Lake. It is expected that Knights from all over the land will attend this unique ceremony. The stamps will also appear on the correspondence of the grand lodge which will convene in Portland in August. Beneath each stamp is the stamped line "This you will see en route to Crater Lake, August 17."

Secretary Streets of the Commercial club received the following letter from L. R. Simpson this morning regarding the stamps:

## AUTO PASSENGER BANK SUSPECT

The authorities in their delving into the mystery of the Rogue River bank robbery are looking for a man carrying an empty suit case who rode with Seelye Hall in the Grants Pass-Medford stage on the day of the crime. He got on at Gold Hill and rode to Rogue River. Hall's description tallies with that given to the authorities, by the man who told of the plot to rob the bank.

The supposition now advanced is that the robber rode to Rogue River in Hall's auto, and that he was carried to safety by the grey Buick Hall saw speeding toward Rogue River, five or ten minutes before the crime. The plans of entrance and exit were planned with the same care as the crime. Hall thinks the robber escaped on the S. P. train through Rogue River at 3:15 o'clock.

Pinkerton detectives are now working on the case, with the usual shroud of mystery, cast over their operations.

## MEETING TO DISCUSS UNEMPLOYMENT

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Commissioner General Caminetti of the bureau of immigration was today working out the details of a national conference at San Francisco, August 2, at which questions of unemployment, the distribution of labor and federal control over private employment offices doing an interstate business will be discussed.

Secretary Wilson of the department of labor, who called the meeting, is sending invitations to the governors of the various states, mayors, heads of state labor bureaus and others to attend. It is hoped to bring about co-operation between the department of labor and the state and municipal authorities, so as to prevent duplication of work, bring about efficient and more uniform methods.

## NEW DAYLIGHT TRAIN ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC

In anticipation of heavy traffic to the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco, the Southern Pacific will install an additional passenger train between Portland and San Francisco, Sunday, May 16. The new train southbound will leave Portland at 8:30 a. m. and arrive in this city at 9:30 p. m. The northbound train will leave San Francisco at 11 p. m., arriving in Medford about 7:30 p. m. There will be slight changes in the time of the present schedule, not yet decided upon.

## BUILDERS TRUST OF CHICAGO FACE FEDERAL COURT

CHICAGO, April 28.—United States deputy marshals began hunting today for the contractors, electrical fixture men and labor leaders who were named in sensational indictments by a federal grand jury here yesterday charged with violating the interstate commerce and anti-trust laws.

The basic allegation is that the defendants conspired to keep non-union articles, and articles manufactured outside Chicago, from coming into the city. It was expected that most of the defendants would surrender voluntarily.

There are one hundred of them—eighteen labor leaders, forty one employers and forty one firms headed by these employers.

Eighteen officials of labor unions, 82 contractors or contracting firms and two alleged trusts were named in the indictments.

The charges in each of the eight indictments are conspiracy to restrain trade, combination in restraint of trade, interfering with interstate commerce and restraining interstate commerce. The labor leaders were charged with having prevented union workmen from unloading or handling goods which had been shipped from outside the state, because of alleged disputes with the concerns to which the goods were billed.

They represent the chief legislation wish of the administration and are regarded as the most important legislation of the session. Under them no candidate for political office in California will carry a party label except candidates for representative in congress and United States senator.

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, April 28.—The International Congress of Women unanimously made Miss Jane Addams, one of the delegates, chairwoman.

The gathering passed resolutions protesting against the madness and horror of war; opposing the assumption that women can be protected

under conditions of modern warfare; recognizing women's responsibility in connection with wars, but declaring that their influence against wars could be effective only with equal political rights; pledging women to do all in their power to promote mutual understanding and good will.

PORTLAND, April 28.—Thomas Scott Brooke, one of the foremost real estate and investment men of Portland walked or jumped out of the second story window of his bath room at his home here this evening, fell twelve feet, lighting on his head on a pavement, and is expected to die.

## DALLES-CEILO CANAL OPENED TO RIVER TRAFFIC

BIG EDDY, Ore., April 28.—Without ostentation the Dalles-Cello canal was opened today to navigation. The canal, which was completed after 10 years of work at an expenditure of \$4,850,000 by the federal government, opens the Columbia river to steamer traffic from the Pacific ocean to Priest Rapids, Wash., a distance of 450 miles, and to Lewiston, Idaho, on the Snake river, a tributary of the Columbia, a distance of 479 miles.

The river steamer Inland Empire, carrying army engineers headed by Colonel Jay J. Morrow, United States engineer corps, who supervised the construction, and civilians interested in river traffic was the first vessel to pass through the canal. She descended from the upper river and passed through the locks at 1:40 p. m.
