"If motorists would study the construction of their tires they would be able to intelligently apply the same care to them that they do to the rest of their cars. No sane driver would for an instant continue to drive his car after he had discovered a serious break in his motor or any other part of its machinery. Then why will that same man ride many miles on a deflated or partially deflated tire and expect no harm to result? Such is often the case, however, and the wonder is, not that the tire goes out, but that they stand this treatment so long."
