### FROST DANGER FOR 1915 SEASON THING OF PAST

The frost danger period for 1915 is about over, according to Special Frost Observer Drake. Under present weather conditions there is little likelihood of a return visit from Jack Fost before the 10th of the month, if then. The records of the weather hureau show that there have been killing frosts in May, but they are the exception. The present senson to date, has brought but two orchard heating periods, though in the low-lying spots heating was resorted to upon three or four occasions.

Seasonal Deficiency

The total rainfall for the season (since September 1) is 10.95, as against an average for twenty-six years of 22.1 inches, making the seasonal shortage 11.15 inches. The average rainfall for May is 1.77 inches.

Frosts were recorded upon April 9, 14 and 22. Snow and sleet feil upon the last two days of the mouth. Upon twelve days more than .01 of an days, six partly cloudy and eight clear days.

The mean maximum temperature was 71 degrees and the minimum 40. The mean temperature was 55.5 degrees. The warmest day was the 16th, with the mercury at 84 degrees. and the coldest the 14th, with a temperature of 28 degrees.
