THE BEAST AND THE JUNGLE

JOHN R. LAWSON, Colorado strike leader, has been convicted by a Colorado jury of first degree murder in connection with the death of John Nimme, a deputy sheriff killed in a clash between mine guards and striking miners, and sentenced to life imprisonment.

The Lawson verdict trumpets abroad the existing conditions in Colorado. It shows how complete is the domination of what Ben Lindsey aptly termed "the Beast and the Jungle."

Lawson's real crime is daring to organize the strikers, daring to defy the powerful mine-owners, daring to oppose Standard Oil. His temerity must be punished, and an example made of him that will effectually deter other liberty-loving souls from attempting to assert the rights of man in a Colorado mine or a Rockefeller camp.

To try Lawson, a special act of the legislature was necessary—and of course forthcoming. A special judge, formerly attorney for mine-owners, named. The prosecutor is also a former mine-owners' attorney.

One thing the Beast does not understand, that unjust persecution reacts and destroys the persecutor. Misuse and abuse of power undermines and eventually causes its collapse. Lawson, the martyr in labor's cause, becomes a national figure when Lawson, the strike leader, was a local personage.

There are none so blind as those who will not see. Because Ben Lindsey exposed the rottenness of Colorado, the Beast set out to destroy him. In twelve years he has been elected or appointed to office ten times. He has faced two recalls. He has lived down calumny and misrepresentation.

And what part did John D. Jr., that mining Miss Nancy of the Sunday school, take in the Lawson parody? Undoubtedly the same part he took in the conduct of the strike—secretly approving every cruel move to crush by might all opponents, while with smug hypocrisy protesting innocence and mumbling platitudes—that is the Rockefeller way.

DENY RIGHT OF GERMANY TO FIX FRYE INDEMNITY

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The text of the American note to Germany denying the suggestion that reparation for the sinking of the American sailing ship William P. Frye by the converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich be made through a German prize court, and reiterating the representations for indemnity, was made public today by the state department.

"In reply to your excellency's note of the 11th inst., which the government of the United States admits the liability of the imperial government for the damages resulting from the sinking of the American sailing vessel William P. Frye by the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich on January 28 last, I have the honor to say, by direction of my government, that while the promptness with which the imperial German government has admitted its liability is highly appreciated, my government feels that it would be inappropriate in the circumstances of this case and would involve unnecessary delay to adopt the suggestion in your note that the legality of the character and destruction,
