

MOTHERS' DAY TO BE OBSERVED NEXT SUNDAY

Among the "red letter" days recently adopted, none is more appealing to all classes and conditions of society than "Mothers' Day."

The founder of it—Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia—tells how she originated the idea, its development, significance and the favor with which it has been received, not only in America, but also throughout the world. The papers in the eastern states first boosted the idea, and among the first organizations to help Miss Jarvis was the Modern Woodmen.

The head consul of this great fraternal order—Mr. Talbot—hailed the idea with delight, recommending their large membership to endorse it. In response to Mr. Talbot's desire, Miss Jarvis gives him the following sketch of the origin of the day and its rapid growth:

"About three years ago an appreciative daughter desired to commemorate the anniversary of her mother's death. It was not only the desire of laying flowers on her mother's grave, but it occurred to her that it would be a beautiful tribute to all mothers—the living as well as dead—if their children would unite in wearing a white flower and thus make 'Mothers' Day' universal. The papers took up the idea and in two years it swept not only all over America, but was also heartily welcomed in other lands."

The purpose of Miss Jarvis is that all lands as one nation will unite on the same day to honor their mothers. The second Sunday in May was decided upon as the day to be observed. A white carnation is to be worn by all who desire to recognize this day. The wearing of this beautiful emblem of purity and truth will prove that the wearer desires to honor his mother if living; her memory if dead. If from home, let the son or daughter write his mother a loving letter or send her a telegram of greeting, telling her of his love for her and his appreciation of the sacrifices she has made for him and her devotion to him all through life. Last year many Sunday schools observed the day by not only wearing a white flower, but by distributing them among those who otherwise would not get them. Mothers' favorite hymns were sung in schools and homes. Miss Jarvis says: "The common possession of the world is mother." Unlike any other "red letter day," this has a living interest in every land, among all classes and creeds. It is a day designed to honor motherhood in a way that will lead to personal, domestic and national happiness. Organizations, mayors of large cities, governors of states, even our president, give this day their hearty endorsement.
