

BARNES' RIVAL PAID REBATE ON STATE PRINTING

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 5.—Chas. M. Winchester, general manager of the J. B. Lyon company of Albany, testified in the supreme court here today that his concern had paid commissions on all orders for public printing received from the Journal company, controlled by William Barnes, who is suing Theodore Roosevelt for alleged libel. The commissions amounted to thousands of dollars. The witness swore he never had talked to Mr. Barnes about printing contracts.

Counsel for Colonel Roosevelt planned to have him go on the stand later in the day.

When court opened John M. Bowers, chief counsel for Colonel Roosevelt, read into the record a digest of the stockholders of the Albany Journal company, compiled from the books furnished by Mr. Barnes. The digest showed that Mr. Barnes held nearly all the common stock and some of the common.

Recent digests showed that preferred stock was also held at different times by Anthony N. Brady, Levi P. Morton, J. B. Lyon, the J. B. Lyon company, O. A. Quayle, Charles R. Hills, Chauncey M. Depew, Nathan Elsborg and others.

William J. Nusbaum, a certified public accountant, the first witness called, was asked to tell about an examination he made of the books of the Journal company. Mr. Bowers said he wanted to show that the J. B. Lyon company paid sums of money—apparently commissions—to the Journal.

Winchester was then recalled. He said the books of that concern showed that there was an account with the Journal company and that there were times when "we paid the Journal company commissions or discounts," upon contracts for state, city and Albany county printing.

ITALIANS HELD IN ATTACK ON SLUETH

CHICAGO, May 5.—Thirteen Italian suspects are being held by the police today as a result of the shooting last night of Detective Sergeant Joseph H. McGuire by two Italians and the rescue of Tony Titcola, a prisoner whom McGuire and his partner, Detective Sergeant George de Mar, were taking to the police station.

McGuire was shot in the hip. The detectives returned the fire and in the excitement their prisoner escaped. The shooting occurred in the heart of the Italian colony on the north side, the scene of many so-called black hand murders. Titcola was arrested on compliance with orders of the city administration to clean out the black hand district.

CLAIM RUSSIAN RETREAT

the forest of Le Pretre, Northwest of Pont-a-Mousson the French attacked yesterday with strong forces. Notwithstanding, a long preparatory bombardment by artillery, their attack broke down under our fire, with heavy losses to the enemy. On the other hand, we began attacks in the forest of Alby and to the east thereof, which made good progress. Up to the present we have here taken ten officers, and 750 men.

"Eastern theater: Attacks from Roceinis, coming from the southeast, were repulsed. The enemy is being pursued at Kalarwaya, also northeast of Suwalki and east of Augustowo numerous Russian advances failed. Four hundred Russians in all were taken prisoners.

"On the remainder of the front there were a few fights at close quarters, all of which were decided in our favor.

"Southeastern theater:

"An attack by the allied troops north of the wooded Carpathians pierced through the third fortified line of the Russians, who yesterday were defeated along the entire front and retreating toward the Wisloka river. The magnitude of the victory may be seen from the fact that, owing to the piercing by the allies of the enemies' lines, the Russians are beginning to evacuate threatened positions on their northern flank, in the wooded Carpathians southwest of Dukla.

"The rapidity with which our successes have been achieved makes it impossible to give an idea in figures of the booty taken in this victory. According to reports at hand, the number of prisoners taken up to the present amounts to over 30,000."

B'NAI B'RITH IN CLEMENCY PLEA FOR LEO FRANK

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Resolutions endorsing appeals for clemency for Leo M. Frank, under death sentence at Atlanta, Ga., probably will be adopted tonight or tomorrow by the Constitution Grand Lodge, Independent Order of B'Nai B'Rith, leaders of the organization said today. The resolutions committee has reported favorably, although the action if ratified will be the first of the kind ever put forth by the grand lodge.

Frank was sentenced to be hanged for the murder of Mary Phagan, a 14-year old factory girl.

This was B'Nai B'Rith day at the Panama Pacific exposition.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Upon the request of counsel for Leo M. Frank, the supreme court today issued its mandate by which the decision of the Georgia federal district court denying Frank a writ of habeas corpus was affirmed. Ordinarily the mandate would not have been issued until May 19. It is believed that the action of Frank's counsel was taken to facilitate the application before the Georgia state officials for commutation of Frank's sentence for the murder of Mary Phagan.

ITALIANS HONOR GARIBALDI DAY

GENOA, via Paris, May 5.—Every train which arrived in Genoa yesterday and last night was crowded with prominent persons from all parts of Italy who have come here on their way to Quarto Sant'Elena to attend the dedication of the monument erected in honor of Garibaldi and his famous thousand, who sailed from the little town in Sardinia on the expedition which resulted in the annexation of Sicily by Italy.

These ceremonies, which it was announced at the eleventh hour King Victor Emmanuel and the members of his cabinet would not attend because they were unable to leave Rome in view of the gravity of the international situation, have been regarded of peculiar political importance, because of the proposed participation of the king might be considered a direct affront to Austria at the time when her political connections were almost at a breaking point. The changing of the king's plans is considered, however, to mean that the negotiations between Italy and the dual monarchy are to be continued on a new basis.

ALLIES WING PAIR OF TURK FLYERS

PARIS, May 5, 5:20 a. m.—Two Turkish aeroplanes have been brought down by shells from the allied warships, according to a dispatch from Saloniki. Setting out from Suddul Bahr, the aeroplanes flew over the fleet, dropping several bombs, all of which, however, fell harmlessly in the water. They had put out to sea to reconnoiter Leantos and Tenedos when they were brought down. The German aviators were rescued and made prisoners.

LOYAL WIFE OF LEO FRANK, CONDEMNED TO DIE, BEGS PUBLIC TO BELIEVE INNOCENT

ATLANTA, Ga., May 5.—"I beg the American people to save my husband's life, because he is innocent."

This is Mrs. Leo M. Frank's plea to the people of this country to help her in her fight to save her husband from the gallows, to which he has been sentenced, charged with the murder of 14-year old Mary Phagan.

"I love and honor my husband today more than ever," declares Mrs. Frank, "because I am sublimely confident of his innocence."

She asks that the American people back up her plea to the governor with petitions, urging that Frank be given a fairer chance to prove his claim of innocence—urging not a pardon, but a commutation of his sentence to one of life imprisonment.

"Every bit of evidence produced at the trial," says Mrs. Frank, "and that which has developed since the trial, shows completely that my husband is not guilty. In the end I know his name will be cleared."

Mrs. Frank is a member of one of the best Jewish families in Atlanta. A woman of refinement and pride—and despite untold sufferings in the two years since Mary Phagan was murdered she has kept her faith in her husband and worked and suffered to save him from death.

During the trial, when vile stories regarding Frank were spread broadcast over the country, she countered them with frank recitals of the clean and pure home life which she asserts her husband loved and always had led.

Never did she let one bit of doubt concerning her husband creep into her mind and she worked untiringly to erase such suspicions from the minds of others.

Every day since the day of her husband's arrest she has visited him in his cell and has done everything in her power to comfort him and keep him buoyed up.

During the trial, when mobs, packed outside of the courtroom, howled his life, she sat by his side and gave him courage.

Frank is fighting as much for his wife as for himself.

"If I had been what I am charged with being, if I was low and vile, would a woman of her traditions, her fine sensibilities, continue to live with me as my wife?" declares Frank.

And Mrs. Frank has proved his contention by her suffering, her loyalty and her fight for her husband.

She believes his vindication will come—she won't give up hope—and so she asks the American people to see that justice is done—to petition the governor of Georgia for clemency.

ROYAL WELCOME FOR LAWSON AT DENVER

DENVER, Colo., May 5.—John R. Lawson, Colorado member of the international board of the United Mine Workers of America, convicted of the murder of John Nimmo, reached Denver from Trinidad today. His train

was met by a delegation representing the United Mine Workers and the Colorado State Federation of Labor. Lawson said he had not determined upon his course of action pending decision on his motion for a new trial. He has considered a visit to his wife, an invalid, in Los Angeles.

ARMENIANS FACE WRATH OF TURKS FOLLOWING ROUT

TIFLIS, May 5.—Three hundred refugees from Dilman have arrived at Julfa, just over the border in Russia, and 1200 more are on their way. The Russian consul here is taking measures to prevent refugees from Urmiah and Dilman entering the Caucasus.

Nedsur, the bishop of Tabriz, Persia, has arrived here. He describes the situation at Van as desperate. Eight hundred Turks and a large number of Kurds are active there, destroying Armenian villages. Of 300 inhabitants of the village of Rasha, only three escaped. The Armenians, according to the bishop, are still hopeful for American and Italian diplomatic interference. At Van they now have been standing the Turks and Kurds off for a week. Four Turkish regiments are advancing against these Armenians from Erzinga.

It is feared that the history of 1895 and 1896 will be repeated.

It is declared in Armenia that the Young Turks have adopted the policy pursued by Abdul Hamid in that year, namely, the annihilation of the Armenians.

The existing state of terror has prevented the planting of crops and a famine is impending. The city of Erzerum in Turkish Armenia, has today 300 cases of typhus fever.
