A MADMAN'S ACT

THE relapse of the German war lord into barbarism is complete. Boasted efficiency but ministers to blood lust and science becomes a strumpet for Mars.

From the ruthless rape of Belgium to the poison-exhaling bombs of Ypres, from the Zeppelins spilling disaster on innocents from the heavens, to submarines darting death to neutrals from under the sea, from the wanton destruction of storied Louvain to the sinking of the Lusitania, runs a narrative of brutal outrage that dims the thousand-year-old record of Attila the Hun as the scourge of Europe.

This is not warfare—it is premeditated murder. Such acts are the wonton crimes of a paranoiac, of a ruler crazed by militarism and insane from power—whose taint calls, like an ancient heathen deity, for the continual sacrifice of innocents.

Of all the blunders of the kaiser's blundering diplomacy, the most stupid is the destruction of the Lusitania. How can he expect the sympathy of neutrals when he deliberately violates international law in their destruction?

The sinking of the Lusitania may bring an iron cross as the "reward of bravery" to the crew of the submarine which brought unseen death to over a thousand neutrals and non-combatants, but Germany's reward will be a world-wide exasperation and a world-wide execration.

MOUNT M'LOUGHLIN

DESPITE efforts to correct the mistake, the name of Mt. Pitt is still erroneously applied to Mt. McLoughlin, the snow-capped sentinel of the Rogue River valley, whose symmetry and beauty deserves a better fate.

Who was Pitt and what did he do for Oregon to deserve such an eternal monument? Pitt was the English statesman who guided the destiny of Britain in the long struggle against Napoleon. He never heard of Oregon.

In 1832 Donald McKay a Hudson Bay trapper, named the mountain McLoughlin, in honor of Dr. John McLoughlin, then factor of the Hudson's Bay company at Vancouver, the founder of Oregon City and the first white resident of Oregon, and it has never since been officially known by any other name.

On February 9, 1905, the house of representatives of the Oregon legislature passed house concurrent resolution No. 27, which passed the senate February 13, 1905, as shown in House Journal, page 916, designating the mountain as Mount McLoughlin.

On December 26, 1908, the Oregon geographic board adopted a resolution declaring the name to be Mount McLoughlin.

On November 11, 1911, the U. S. geographic board passed a resolution declaring as follows: "McLoughlin, peak, Cascade range, southern Oregon, latitude 42° 26' (Not McLaughlin, not Pitt).

How did the mountain come to be called Mt. Pitt? In the latter '70s Captain Applegate ran a survey for a railroad from the Umpqua valley, over the Trail divide, up Butte creek, skirting the base of Mt. McLoughlin, over the Fish Lake pass into the Klamath country, thence via the Pitt river to California.

Pioneers never heard of Mt. Pitt, and in the course of a few years it will never be heard of again, as both government and railroad maps in the future will give the mountain its correct name.

ALPINE, Tex., May 11.—Two Mexicans of a band of twelve smugglers were killed and others wounded today in a running fight with a United States river guard and Texas rangers fifty miles below Bouquillas.

LINER'S SCHEDULE NOT DISTURBED BY LUSITANIA'S LOSS

NEW YORK, May 11.—No general cancellation of the sailings of steamers or of passengers engaged from New York to European ports has followed the sinking of the Lusitania, according to agents of steamship lines here.

The agent of the French line said the sinking of the Lusitania would not prevent them from sending their steamers across as usual.

Agents of the White Star line said the Cymric would sail from New York for Liverpool next Friday, according to schedule.

At the office of the Cunard line it was said that no instructions had been received from Liverpool regarding the sailing of its steamers and there had been no cancellation.

It was estimated that 2,330 passengers are on board the various steamers from American ports bound for destinations that will take them within range of German submarine activities.
