allegiance and officers of each branch have been arrested. There has been established the so-called republic of Northern Portugal under the presidency of General Barreto and there have been labor disorders of a serious nature.

Situation Grows Worse This is the nature of the news that has come from Portugal in spite of the strict censorship maintained by the Portuguese authorities. Month by month the situation in Portugal appears to have grown worse. The life of the republic of Portugal since its establishment five years ago, after the assassination of King Carlos, has been marked by political dissensions of strife. There have been frequent reports of royalist agitation from Lisbon but since the beginning of the European war the activities of another movement, the democratic or radical, have been even more threatening to the existing government.

MOTHERS CONGRESS DECRIES WARFARE; TRUSTS PRESIDENT

PORTLAND, Or., May 15.—At the final session here today of the nineteenth annual conference of the national conference of mothers and Parent-Teachers' associations, resolutions were adopted decrying militarism and expressing its trust that President Wilson may be able to bring about a permanent peace between the United States and Germany. The peace resolutions concluded as follows:

"Whereas, the task of guiding our country through a grave crisis in the history of the world devolves today mainly on the president of the United States, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the national congress of Mothers and Parent-Teachers' Associations extends to him its earnest sympathy, trusting with God's guidance he may bring about a permanent peace between warring nations."

The resolutions also declared that the national congress of Mothers, in the name of the motherhood of the world, hereby voices its rejection of the wanton and unnecessary destruction of our children brought into the world through pain and suffering to receive a higher purpose than that of sacrifice to the greed of nations.

GRANTS PASS CONTRACTOR KILLS SELF WITH GUN

GRANTS PASS, May 15.—Henry J. Clarke, a contractor and builder, committed suicide Wednesday by shooting himself in the breast with a shotgun. He had been in poor health and was confined to his bed most of the time. He lived in this state for the past forty years and buildings constructed by him can be found in nearly every city in western Oregon. He was formerly in the brickmaking and contracting business at Albany, where he will be buried. He was a member of Ashland Lodge of Elks.
