THAW TRANSFERRED FROM TOMBS TO JAIL

NEW YORK, May 18.—Supreme Court Justice Hendrick signed an order today transferring Harry Thaw from the Tombs to the custody of the sheriff in Ludlow Street jail.

This was done in response to a request from Thaw's counsel who had complained that Thaw was suffering from rheumatism and throat trouble and did not receive sufficient exercise in the Tombs. Thaw's counsel made the request in event there should be further delay of the jury trial to test his sanity. The state attorney general has secured a stay of the trial until Friday at least.

SEATTLE, Wn., May 18.—Henry Suzzalo, professor of philosophy in the teachers college of Columbia University, New York City, will be elected president of the University of Washington by the board of regents today. The office of president has been filled temporarily by Henry Landes, late head of the geology department for the past eighteen months, while the regents were seeking a new executive head. Professor Suzzalo is in the city. He was born in San Jose, Cal., educated at Stanford University and is in his fortieth year.

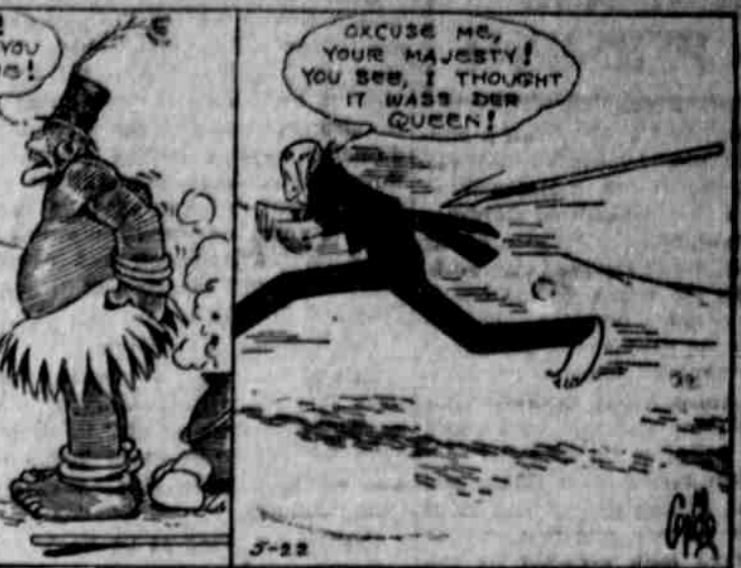
