# SPOTTED FEVER IN EASTERN OREGON

PORTLAND, May 19 .- Tick fever or spotted fever as it is sometimes called, is more prevalent in eastern Oregon this year than ever before, according to Dr. Calvin S. White, of the state board of health, who returned from there today. The fever is the same disease which has made the Bitter Root valley in Montana almost uninhabitable to man for a number of years.

Fourteen cases have been reported from Grant county this year and others are being reported almost daily from other counties. About 15 percent have proved fatal as compar ed with 90 percent in Montana. As a result of Dr. White's investigations the state will begin a similar campaign to that conducted by the government in the Bitter Root valley. to rid the country of ticks, the bite of which causes the fever.
