

MOHONK PEACE ADVOCATES HEAR CALL TO ARMS

President of Princeton University Shocks Pacifists Who Favor Disarmament by Advocating a Wise Preparedness of Military Forces Against War.

MOHONK LAKE, N. Y., May 19.—Dr. John Grier Hibben, president of the Princeton university, stirred the Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration today by taking issue with pacifists who favor disarmament and by advocating a wise preparedness of our military forces in the United States. "I don't advocate preparedness for war," he said, "but a preparedness against war—a preparedness which, in the event of the catastrophe of war itself, will prevent the enormous initial sacrifice of human lives which has characterized every war in which the United States have been engaged."

"No one can be so blind regarding the significance of present conditions, as to take the position that a grave national emergency is not at least a possibility."

Revolutionary Warfare
Without naming any of the belligerents, Dr. Hibben asserted that one fallacy tending to obstruct the progress of peace was that "this present terrible war has developed certain practices and usages which will revolutionize the accepted restrictions of international law so that hereafter all immemorial obligations of nation to nation in a state of war will be swept away."

"In the high tension of international hate and international suspicion the most insignificant accident may chance to precipitate for us a national catastrophe and in the great emergency, if it should come, what shall we say? Peace? Peace at any price?"

"By all means, let us pay any price which can buy peace—restraint of passion, long suffering, sacrifice of material wealth of every convenience and comfort. Let us sacrifice it all, everything which can buy peace. But let us not forget that there are some things which cannot buy peace. If we sacrifice them in order to secure peace, the peace thus sought becomes for us the very torment of a living hell. We dare not trade honor for peace."

First in Twenty-One Years
Never in the twenty-one years of its existence had the Lake Mohonk conference heard such a call to arms. The Princeton president's appeal aroused intense interest and discussion among the 200 delegates here from all parts of the country.

SALOONS CURSE OF MINE CAMPS SAYS PREACHER

Methodist Clergyman, Head of Welfare Work, Says Rockefeller Company in Partnership With Dives That Fatten Off Earnings of Miners—Company Controls Politics.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Responsibility for the Colorado coal strike was laid at the door of minor officials of the coal companies directly in touch with the men, according to testimony today before the industrial commission, by Eugene Gadis, a Methodist clergyman and former president of the social work for the Colorado Fuel and Iron company.

Sociological conditions in the camps, in which betterment work had been undertaken, were generally bad and "curse by saloon associations," and in many cases "disreputably disgraceful." One of the directors of the company, he said, told him in Denver, a few years ago: "We might as well confess it, we have not given the miners anything but the saloon."

Ran by Human Ghoul
The policy of the company, said the witness, "is to condone parcelling out camp saloons, many in company buildings, to human ghoul who operate them illegally in connivance with the marshals. Saloons after pay days are chambers of horrors and outlaws fattening on the earnings of the miners with the tacit approval of Mr. Rockefeller's officials."

"Is it a fact," asked Chairman Walsh, "that the Colorado Fuel and Iron company still has control of politics in Colorado?"

"They control it as far as they dare," Gadis replied, "although I don't think they do it to such an extent as before the coal strike. They absolutely controlled it before the strike."

Company in Politics
"The Colorado Fuel and Iron company for many years," he wrote, "were accused of being the political dictator of southern Colorado and in fact were a mighty power in the entire state. When I came here it was said the C. F. & I. Co., voted every man and woman in their employ without any regard to their being naturalized or not; and even their mules, it used to be remarked, were registered if they were fortunate enough to possess names."

"Anyhow, a political department was maintained at a heavy expense. "The company became notorious in many sections for their support

of the liquor interests. They established saloons everywhere they possibly could. A sheriff elected by the votes of the C. F. & I. company employees and who has been kept in office a great many years established himself or became a partner in sixteen liquor stores in our coal mines."

LARGE DELEGATION TO HEAR GOVERNOR

FOSTER PLEADS GUILTY TO ARSON IN CIRCUIT COURT

Though a prison sentence of from ten to twenty years awaits him, Harry Foster, indicted on two counts for burglary and one for arson, pleaded guilty in the circuit court today to the greater crime and will be sentenced by Circuit Judge Callkin in the morning.

Foster is alleged to have burglarized and burned the home of County Judge Wilson, who, when he was in need, befriended him, giving him food and clothing. During the absence of the Wilson family one day the house was robbed. Foster was suspected. A few weeks later the family was again robbed and then ignited to cover up the evidence of the crime. Foster afterwards was connected with the selling of some of the stolen jewelry in this city.

William Hall, indicted for raising checks, and David Alexander, charged with an immoral offense, also

pleaded guilty. J. Reinery, indicted for burglary, plead not guilty, making out one criminal case to come before the petit jury when it convenes next Monday for the May term. Reinery may change his plea to guilty. Sentences will be imposed this morning.
