Mr. Moore has sold his two farms on Elk creek, one to William Suttgers and the other to his son, William Moore.

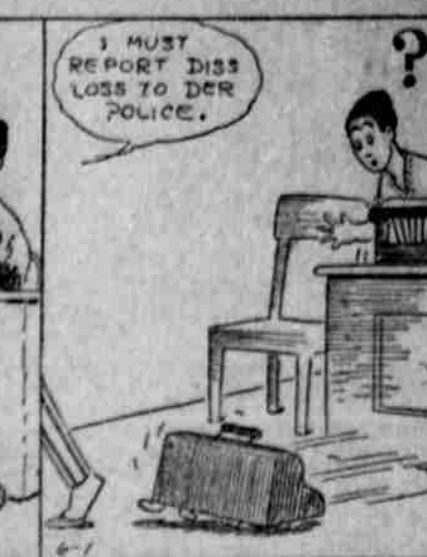
Mrs. Anglee Green, who has been up in Washington this spring, returned home Thursday night.

The services were preceded by a vocal concert given by the combined glee clubs of the high school under the direction of Miss Hinman. Miss Hinman and Miss Fern Pleasence led the congregation with two pretty sacred songs.

On Wednesday evening the senior play, "The Country Doctor," was enjoyed by the utmost by a full and appreciative house. The thirteen members of the class who took part in it are worthy of congratulation for the manner in which each sustained the part. Time and again the house rang with applause.

Tickets sold at 25 and 35 cents and the proceeds were more than \$70, so you can judge something of the size of the crowd.

Thursday evening class day exercises at the high school followed by a general class mix, held the board. The new president of the student body, Merritt Owen, handled the meeting like a veteran at the business speeches by the class officers, members of the school board and school faculty made a full evening.

The crowning event of the occasion was the high school commencement exercises at Central hall on Friday evening. The minimum requirements for graduation is fifteen high school units, as is required by the standard high school course, but the average attainment of this class is seventeen and one half credits. The class is remarkable in that there are nearly double the number of boys than girls in it.
