

PANAMA CANAL TRIP LIKE SAILING BEAUTIFUL LAKES

(By Gilson Gardner.) ON BOARD S. S. FINLAND, en route Panama to San Diego, May 27. —Going through the Panama canal is like sailing through two moderate sized beautiful artificial lakes. One is about eighteen miles long, the other about nine miles. The waters are placid, the shores are indented and covered with wonderfully variegated tropical growth. Sometimes they are distant and sometimes a few feet from the steamer. When close, a bird chorus, as of hundreds of little canaries, is heard. At first there are swampy looking flats, and later quite respectable hills—all very picturesque and pleasing. Snags and the bare skeletons of dead trees, killed by the rising waters, mar the beauty in places but these are rapidly rotting and dropping into the water.

**Looks Like Stairways** Of course there are the locks, like stairways at each end of the lake—at first three big steps to get up into the first big lake, 85 feet above the Atlantic; then two steps down to get into the smaller lake; and then three steps down to the sea level canal. Orderliness is the keynote of the locks. All moves like clockwork. The big ship slips into the cement tank; the gates close behind without a jolt or a jar, the water wells up mysteriously from beneath, and the happy-looking negroes carrying the lawser line look up and smile.

Nobody seems to be doing anything. Everything happens by magic, of its own accord. The mother whose husband is a canal employe comes down with the baby in her arms and watches the ship through, much as the country dweller goes to the station to see the evening accommodation arrive and depart. The baby waves at the passengers and the passengers think of babies at home and wave back.

**Culebra Difficult** The Culebra cut is still difficult of passage. The dredgers and blasters were at work when we went through and there were five minutes when the Finland was on the bottom, and passengers wondered whether it would get off. The captain's one idea after leaving New York was to get past the point of a possible block by slides. Any delay must come at the Pacific end of the ditch. So at Panama (Balboa and Ancon) we anchored for a night and a day, and the passengers went ashore and bought Panama hats, pongee silk, Palm Beach suits and things to eat. Some stopped at the government hotel, the Tivoli, and are willing to give a testimonial to Uncle Sam as hotel keeper. It was clean, cool, comfortable, well appointed, with good food at reasonable rates.

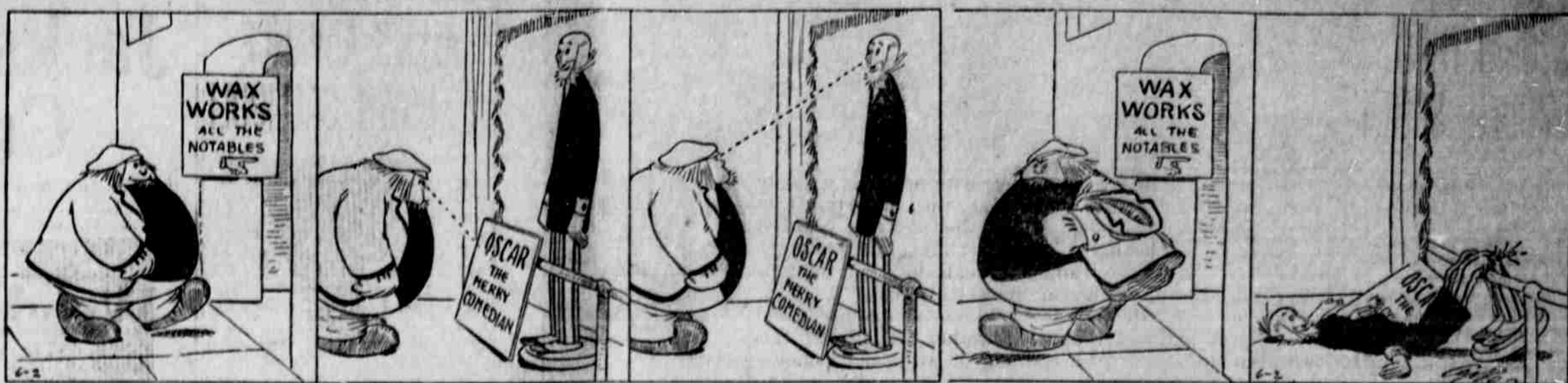
The heat at the canal zone was actually less than before arriving, and after leaving there. Soon after leaving New York blankets and wraps are discarded and for many days the weather is tropical. Off the gulf the ocean water was 86 degrees Fahrenheit and the air much hotter.
