But whatever the motive, the assault has been violent and in force along a front of about 25 folles, the hardest présuire being brought to hear in the Russians along the Harra and the Rawka rivers.

Siege of Przemyst

VIENSA, June 3.-Przemyel was aptured by the Russians on March 22 but after one of the longest siegus Austrians and Germans have made every effort to retake the fortress. large forces being diverted for this purpose from the other great fortress es to the west of Cracow.

When Przemysi fell into the hands of the Russians it had undergone a slege fasting 201 days. The Austrian garrison originally conduted of 170, About 120,000 surrendered when the fortress capitulated. These included 2602 officers and 117 000 men.
