Farmers of the valley are making the first cutting of hay, the sunshine of the last week aiding in the work.

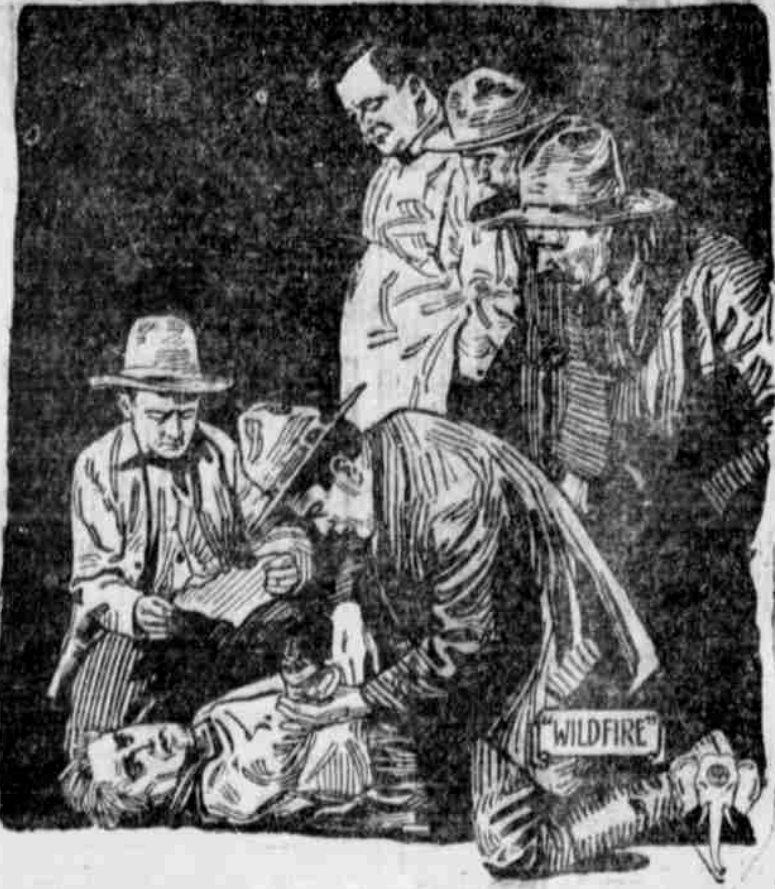
