Last year we saved the taxpayers \$26,000, which enabled us to lower the taxes one and seven-tenths mills, and I know we will do better than that this year.

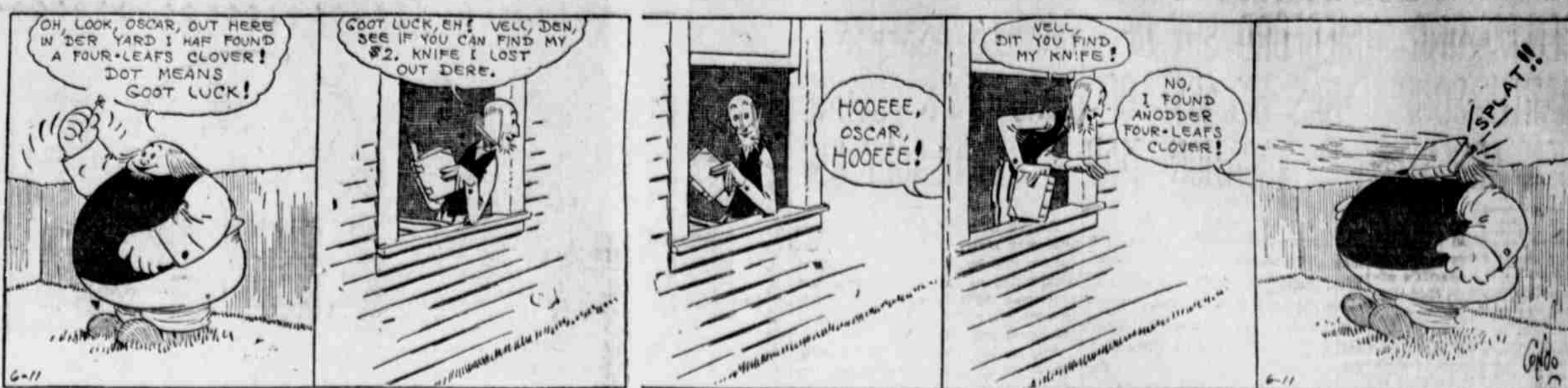
SCALDED TO DEATH TAKING A BATH

RUSSIANS SAVED WAR MATERIALS FROM PRZEMYSL

PETROGRAD, June 4.—Russian troops on the fronts to the north and west of the fortress of Przemysl evacuated their positions Wednesday night after all the war materials taken from the Austrians had been removed, according to an official statement issued last night by the Russian general staff.

It is explained that after the capture of Jaroslau and Radvyno by the Austro-German forces they began to spread along the west bank of the San, making the defense of Przemysl a difficult task.

"We carried away from Przemysl the materials taken from the Austrians. This finished, we removed on Tuesday the last of our batteries. The following night our troops, pursuant to orders, evacuated the forts to the north and west of the positions surrounding the city and formed a more concentrated force to the east.

"In the regions beyond the Dniester the enemy, concentrating important forces in the town of Stry, succeeded in advancing on the Tisminizza-Stry front. They sustained great losses, however, leaving a thousand prisoners in the course of our counter-attacks.

"On the Switza-Lomnita front Monday we pressed the enemy on the Bystra and successfully repulsed his attacks."

ANOTHER SPRAYING WILL BE NECESSARY

Recent examination of orchards which were sprayed with arsenate of lead before or during the rainy period of the past few weeks shows the fruit surfaces to be almost or quite free from the poison.

Seab has also been unusually active during the damp weather, and there is still sufficient moisture on the fruit surfaces during the night to induce spore germination.

Great care should be exercised to prevent drenching the trees, since burning is more likely to result from such practice, especially when lime-sulphur and lead arsenate are used in combination.
