WILL BE NECESSARY

Recent examination of orehards which were sprayed with arsenate of lead before or during the rainy perind of the past few weeks shows the fruit surfaces to be almost or quite free from the poison. The cool, damp weather has also retarded the activity and development of the codling moth, so that the greatest damage from "worms" may be expected within the next few weeks. To prevent this injury, another arsenate of lead spray at the rate of four pounds to 100 gallons should be applied as soon

s possible. Seab has also been unusually netye during the damp weather, and there is still sufficient moisture on the fruit surfaces during the night to induce spore germination. Infested orehards should therefore be sprayed. again with lime-sulphur at the rate of 215 gallons of the stock solution to 100 gallons of water, or with atomic sulphur at the rate of 12 pounds to 100 gallons of water. It is well to ase the same material as was applied in the last seab spray. These materi-
