O. C. King of Medford was doing business with F. L. Heath Friday.

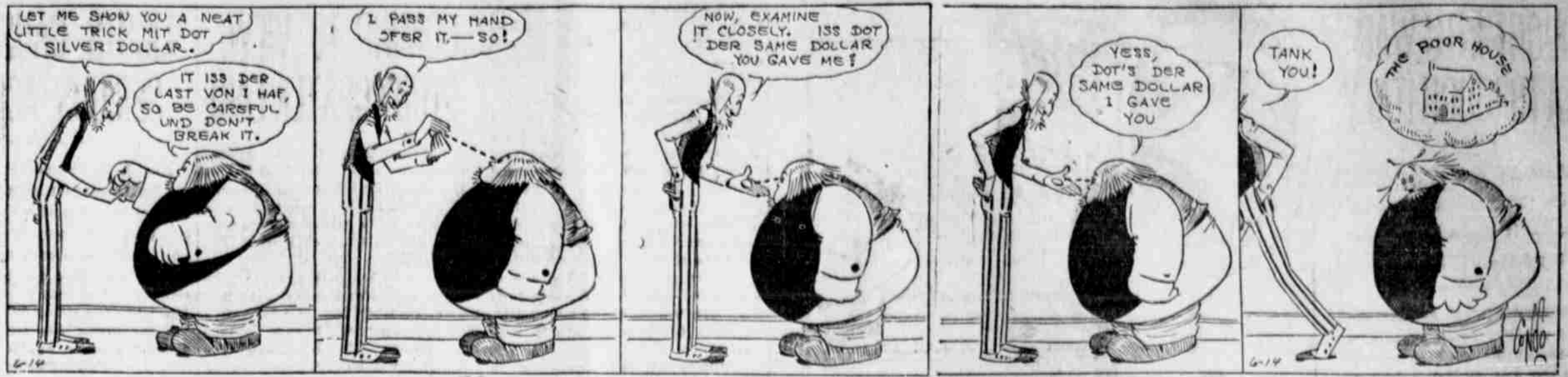
The family of W. Hart Hamilton arrived Thursday and moved into the Vanscoy house.

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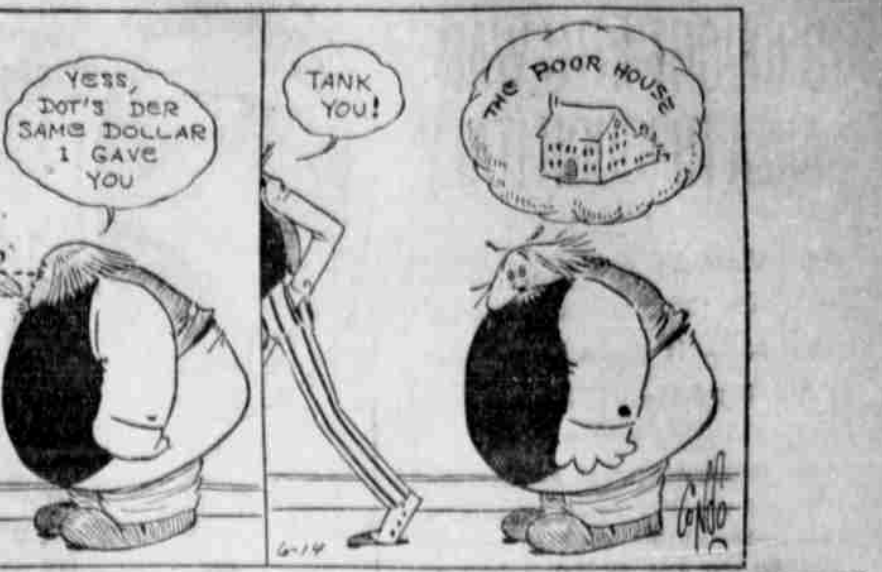
