6,409 BRITISH PERISH IN NAVAL DISASTERS

LONDON, June 11, 4:12 p. m.—The total number of officers and men who have perished through the sinking of British naval craft since the outbreak of the war is 6,409, according to a statement made by T. J. McNamara, financial secretary of the admiralty in the house of commons this afternoon.

This total does not include the men who lost their lives on the mine-layer Princess Irene and the British battleship Bulwark, both of which were blown up in Skerress Harbor.

THE PRESIDENT'S NOTE

THE president's note to Germany, while firm and insistent, is friendly, and makes one wonder what it contained that caused the resignation of Bryan.

The note surely offers no excuse for a declaration of war between the two nations. No penalty is threatened or implied, and the note cannot in any way be construed as an ultimatum.

The note is a solemn warning, a grave appeal to Germany's better sense. America's case is simply and forcibly stated, the cause of humanity eloquently pleaded, the right of the nation upheld and justice demanded. It is an indictment of twentieth century piracy of the seas as practiced by German submarines.

As the president well says:

The government of the United States is contending for something much greater than mere rights of property or privileges of commerce. It is contending for nothing less high and sacred than the rights of humanity, which every government honors itself in respecting and which no government is justified in resigning on behalf of those under its care and authority.

WAR DEGRADING WOMAN

WHILE the war may be shoving women ahead industrially in Europe, it is also shoving them backward a good many centuries in other ways. The sex is fast resuming its tribal condition of burden-bearer and toiler, while the opposite sex are resuming their ancient occupation on the battle line. The women are supplanting men in most industry and in the fields and carrying on the work of the nation.

But this is the least part of the change. The perpetuation of the race seems to be the paramount desideratum of the various nations. The moral code has been virtually abolished. Woman is given to understand, as in the beginning of civilization, that her first duty to the nation is to bear children—legally or illegally—and even the primitive forms of matrimony are discarded.

After the thirty years' war in Germany, every soldier—and all men were soldiers—was ordered to take at least two wives, and a law passed legitimatizing all births. By these methods Germany, which had been woefully reduced in population, was repopulated. Today women in Germany are virtually ordered to have children, as of old, to increase the power of the nation. Miss Jane Addams is authority for the statement that midwives and nurses are sent in the wake of the armies so that the government may care for the children of the soldiers by ravished women in conquered land.

France has passed a law providing that there shall be no such thing as illegitimacy in the country during the war—virtually all women in France that it is their patriotic duty to bear children. "Foundlings" boxes are placed in the churches for the state to care for abandoned offspring.

England has not as yet legally let down the bars, but the "excesses" of soldiers are connived at by the government, and thousands of "war babies" are the result.

The result of all this will probably be a looseness of morals throughout Europe and the world—perhaps a reconstruction of the moral code, a return to the laws of nature. At any rate, it emphasizes the relapse to barbarism of the world's most civilized nations and constitutes one of the most emphatic arguments against war.

"Mothers, Let Your Daughters Develop the Home Instinct." Plea of Famous Opera Singer

Let us begin at the beginning:

The young mother bends over the cradle where sleeps her little daughter and dreams, dreams of the time when love shall come to her—but she seldom dreams beyond the placing of the marriage ring.

"And then they married and lived happily ever after" is an idea that she learned from her fairy book days and so at that point her dream ends.

I wonder does she realize that she can commence almost immediately to make that dream come true for her darling?

First, she can put back into her arms the doll that has gone out of fashion. Yes, I know we have kewpie dolls and paper dolls and Paris dolls and character dolls—every kind of doll except the sensible baby or little girl doll—the doll that can be undressed, its clothes made, mended and laundered that our grandmothers loved.

Teddy bears and poodle dogs are but makeshifts, but every young mother should see that her little daughter has a family of dolls to care for. She should be taught to make their clothes with painstaking stitches.

I myself got my first love of children from my dolls; my great hope was for a real baby that would take the place of my china, wax and rag ones.

A little girl who is taught to play with dolls is learning by the Montessori method the profession of motherhood. Too much have dolls been neglected by the modern mother, too invidious has been the cry, "bring

our girls up to play outdoor games with their brothers."

The great out-of-doors is a splendid playground, but mothers, yet your daughters play at keeping house out there with shells and stones to mark the rooms and leaves and mud to fashion into pies.

ITALY TO KEEP MILLION TEUTONS BUSY ON FRONT

LUGANO, Switzerland, June 11.—Information has been received here from Italian sources that Italy has made an agreement with her allies as to the extent of her offensive campaign. According to this information, which lacks confirmation, the Italian government has undertaken to conduct operations of a character which will compel Austria and Germany to bring up and keep engaged an army of one million men.

Italian operations have not yet been carried to the point necessitating the use by the central empires of an army of such size, but it is expected the development of the Italian campaign beginning with the heavy fighting along the Isonzo river, will compel Italy's opponents to reinforce their armies largely.

The immediate Italian objectives are Trent, Trieste and Villach, the provincial capital of Carinthia.

FRENCH PLAN TO INCREASE MUNITIONS

PARIS, June 11.—The French government took action today for the purpose of increasing the country's output of war munitions. The plan decided upon is designed primarily to facilitate production by the private manufacturing concerns.

Workmen who have been called to the front, but whose services are considered indispensable in particular branches of the industries affected, will be brought back and sent to the factories, other men taking their places in the trenches. Everything possible will be done to obtain the maximum output of war materials.

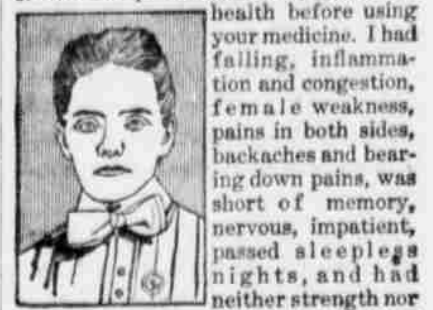
