The regular annual election for the Ashland school district occurs June 21. One director is to be elected, and it is conceded that O. F. Carson will succeed himself in that capacity.

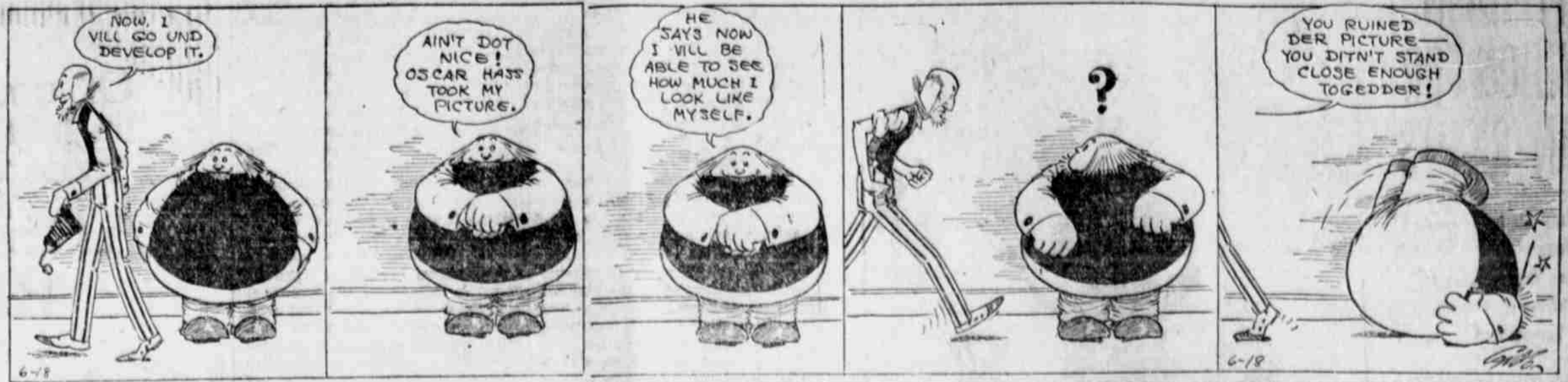

At the park just at present the most notable improvements are connected with the automobile camp grounds. A natural spring is being developed on the premises. City water will also be piped to the grounds and gas service installed. Over 2000 feet of six-inch sewer is being laid. Camp privileges will include shelter in the way of substantial housing, a kitchenette and other accessories. Frank Clark, architect, of Medford, is looking after construction work in the way of installation of buildings. The automobile camp grounds will be provided with every requisite.
