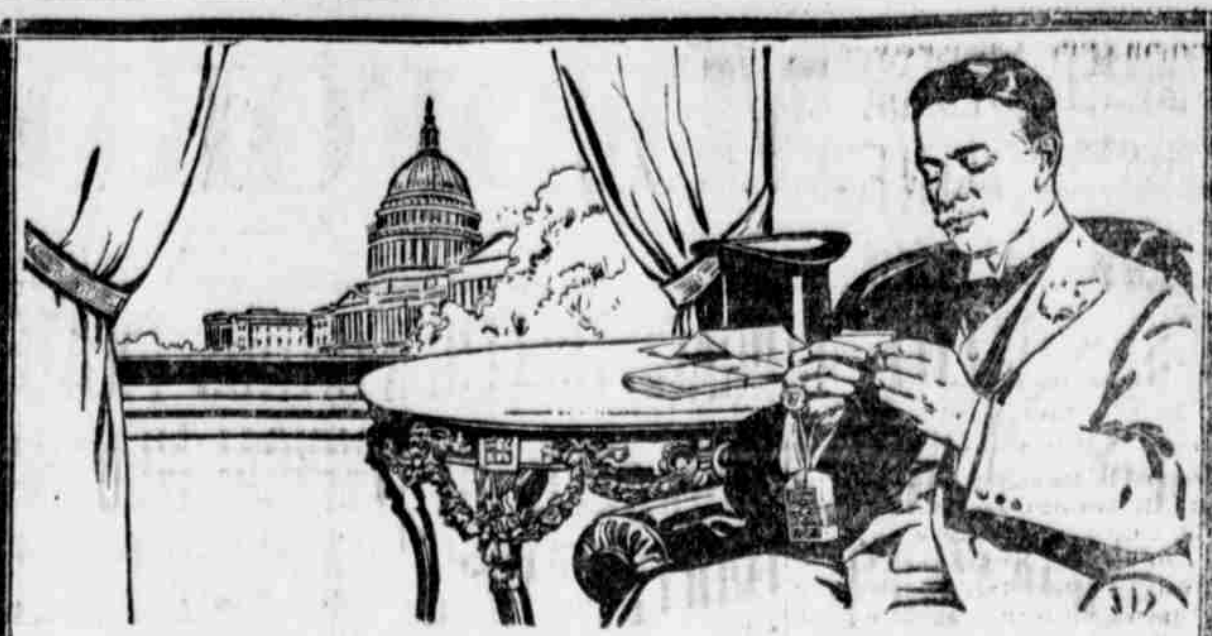
The new Southern Pacific train will go into commission Tuesday.

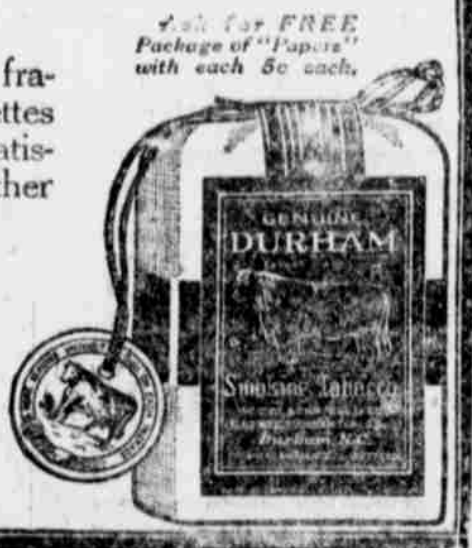
