Taft favors united church to aid peace.

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.—A plea for world peace with a united church to aid nations in preventing wars, was voiced by former President Taft today at the 43rd commencement at Swarthmore college.

Mr. Taft said he believed that when the present struggle in Europe is ended the trend of international public opinion will be toward a league of nations whose interest in the maintenance of universal peace will make them recognize the advantage of a union against war.

CHICAGO, June 15.—Flag day—the day which celebrates American peace and unity, was chosen as the appropriate day to launch the "peace hat" and the wings of the peace dove fluttered at the heads of many fashionable women in the Flag day procession on Lake Shore Drive. The "peace hat," which consists chiefly of two dove wings fastened to a crownless band of tulle, is Miss Virginia Rappe's contribution to the American peace movement. Miss Rappe, whose patriotism won for her the name "American Beauty Girl," when she was in Paris and London in the early days of the world war, is organizing a movement to substitute the peace note for the military note in women's clothes. "The women of America want world peace," said Miss Rappe today. "We should express our peace sentiments in our clothes. If we believe in peace why wear military jackets and soldier caps? Clothes influence our minds. I believe that if we wear the dove of peace and the beautiful American colors we will soon create a strong sentiment for peace. We believe in peace—our clothes should proclaim our faith in peace."

INDIANA OFFICIAL IMPEACHED BY COURT

INDIANAPOLIS, June 16.—The Indiana supreme court today impeached Eli H. Redman, formerly judge of the Vigo county circuit court at Terre Haute, declaring there was no dispute over the facts in the case. The court, however, denied the request of Attorney General Milburn, who filed the impeachment proceedings, that "the defendant be disfranchised and rendered ineligible for office hereafter."

BRITISH CAPTURE LABASSEE TRENCHES

PARIS, June 16.—The French war office this afternoon issued a statement on the progress of hostilities reading: "British troops yesterday captured a line of German trenches to the west of Labassee. There is nothing of importance to report from the remainder of the front. A German airship was compelled to come to land within our lines at a point near Noroy-Sur-Orgon, to the northeast of La Ferté Milon. The aviators were made prisoners."

PEACE LEAGUE PLANS TO BND NATIONS

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.—Plans for the formation of a League of Peace which would bind the nations of the world in a pact of amity, will be discussed by distinguished men of this country at a banquet here tonight. Other sessions of the conference will be held tomorrow in Independence Hall. Former President Taft is to be one of the speakers.
