SHIP REMAINS OF STEWART PATTERSON TO FORMER HOME

Stewart Patterson, Rogue River valley orchardist and member of a noted and wealthy Chicago family of the same name, died Friday afternoon, aged 38, at Sacred Heart hospital, from injuries received in an auto accident at the P. & E. crossing early Friday morning. The body was shipped to Chicago this afternoon for burial. Patterson did not regain consciousness after the accident. The death came as a shock to the community, for Mr. Patterson was popular among a large circle of friends.

The other injured members of the party are practically out of danger. J. C. Bullinger of San Francisco, the worst injured, sustained a compound fracture of the thigh. A Seattle specialist arrived today to operate, to prevent lameness when the break heals. It is not thought that Lucio Minter suffered internal injuries, as first feared.

Scores of people visited the Crater Lake garage Friday to view the wrecked Simplex car, and many journeyed to the crossing and viewed the scene of the tragedy. Six weeks ago A. Starr of Talent, driving a Ford car at a high rate of speed, dashed off the pavement at the same place and received severe injuries.

Burglars entered the Eades second hand store on South Fir street Friday night and by clever manipulation of the combination of the safe opened the same and secured \$4. Razors, knives and a camera were taken by the burglar. The loss was discovered this morning when the store was opened. SWEDES ARE ROILED BY SHIP'S DESTRUCTION

LONDON, June 15.—The anger of the public and the press is rising daily over German attacks on neutral shipping," says Reuter's Stockholm correspondent. "Newspapers of all shades of opinion are protesting energetically against the capture of the Swedish steamer Torsten and the sinking of the Swedish steamer Verdandi, both of which carried certificates that they had nothing aboard which the Germans could consider contraband. Some of the newspapers are discussing the question whether, in addition to protests the Swedish government should not consider adopting some form of reprisal."
