PLAN CAMPAIGN FOR BEET ACREAGE

Further assurances have been received by W. H. Gore and other local sugar beet enthusiasts that the Idaho Sugar company will build an \$800,000 factory in this valley, provided it is demonstrated that the product can be successfully grown in this section. It is now the intention of the great corporation to open offices in this city in the fall and make an active campaign for acreage. Tests of beets grown to date show them to be in excellent condition. What the summer heat without irrigation will do remains to be seen. Early in June a beet sugar committee will be organized and a systematic campaign mapped out. It is necessary that all the acreage be in by October 1 to allow for the proper care of the soil and to avoid duplication of crops, which was one of the difficulties last spring.

LITTLE INTEREST IN SCHOOL ELECTION

The annual school election is being held at the high school this afternoon, the polls opening at 2 o'clock and closing at 6 o'clock. Two candidates are being voted upon, B. J. DOCTORS HASTEN TO SAN FRANCISCO FOR ANNUAL MEET

To commemorate the part preventive medicine played in making the Panama canal possible physicians and surgeons from every part of the United States are heading for San Francisco to take part in the sixtieth annual session of the American Medical Association, which opens on June 22.

The second day of the convention, at which an attendance of more than 5000 medical men and visitors are expected, will be devoted to a commemorative day program on the grounds of the Panama-Pacific exposition.

More than 2000 persons gathered in mass meeting in the capitol grounds and passed a resolution condemning Governor Slaton's action in commuting Leo M. Frank's sentence to life imprisonment today.

At the mass meeting in the capitol grounds a speaker admonished everyone present to march to "Five Points" as a demonstration against the governor's action.

At the opening session of the convention the delegates will be called to order by President Victor C. Vaughan of the American Medical Association. Addresses of welcome will be made by Governor Johnson of California and by Mayor Ralph of San Francisco.

Praise especially will be given to the work in the canal zone of Surgeon-General W. C. Gorgas, who will attend the convention. Attention will be called to the fact that had he not succeeded in practically wiping out yellow fever and malaria in the canal zone, Uncle Sam would have been no more able to push the great work to completion than were the French under the direction of De Lesseps.

The convention will be in session until June 25, and many new and interesting ideas and experiences in medicine and surgery are expected to be discussed.

Doctors who have but recently returned from the battlefields of Europe will tell of new discoveries and progress made, especially in surgery, as a result of the war.

In speeches by members of the Association the delegates will be called to order by President Victor C. Vaughan of the American Medical Association.

M. A. and by exposition and municipal officials tribute will be paid to the fact that without the aid of physicians and medical science the Panama canal never could have been built.

Another feature of the first day's program will be the introduction and installation of Dr. William L. Rodman of Philadelphia, president-elect of the American Medical Association.
